

More Than 700,000 Oregonians Expected To Cast Ballots Today

Portland — (AP) — More than 700,000 Oregonians were expected to cast ballots in today's general election to climax months of heated campaigning.

Scattered light showers were forecast for western Oregon and partly cloudy weather for eastern Oregon.

State Election Chief David O'Hara predicted an 80 to 85 per cent voter turnout.

Polls opened at 8 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

Control of the next Senate could rest on the outcome of the Oregon vote. Senator Wayne Morse, twice elected as a Republican but now a member of the Democratic party, is opposed

by Douglas McKay, former governor of the state and Secretary of the Interior in the Eisenhower cabinet. Battle for the seat has claimed national attention.

Three incumbent Republican representatives, Harris Ellsworth, Sam Coon and Walter Norblad, are up for reelection as is Edith Green, the lone Democrat in Oregon's House delegation.

Ellsworth is opposed by Charles O. Porter and Coon faces Al Ullman. Both men faced the same opponents in their 1954 campaigns. Jason Lee is attempting to unseat Norblad while Phil

Roth is the Republican nominee for the post now held by Mrs. Green.

Voters will fill all three posts on the State Board of Control with the governorship, state treasurer and secretary of state all up for decision. Republicans now hold all three offices. Gov. Elmo Smith, who took office upon the death of Paul Patterson earlier this year, is opposed by Robert Holmes.

Sig Unander, the incumbent state treasurer, is seeking return to that office. Multnomah county treasurer Wiley Smith has the Democratic nomination for the position. Monroe Sweetland,

Democrat, and Mark Hatfield, Republican, have their party nominations for secretary of state to replace Earl T. Newberry, not a candidate in this election.

Other top state officers to be named in the voting include the attorney general and one position on the state Supreme Court.

Democratic incumbent Robert Y. Thornton is seeking return to the attorney generalship and faces Republican Carl Francis. A three-way write-in campaign for a Supreme Court position was among Justice William McAllister of Medford, Judge David R. Vandenberg of Klamath Falls

and Peter Welch, Multnomah county surveyor.

Seven measures faced voters including one to allow an emergency clause to go on tax measures passed by the Legislature, another to ban commercial fishing in streams south of the Columbia river, and one to put a three-cent per pack tax on cigarettes.

Two Cows Killed Near Talent About Same Time Monday

Two cows belonging to Paul Nerval Allen, route 1, box 230, Talent, were killed after being struck by vehicles about 7:02 p.m. Monday on Highway 99, one mile south of Talent.

State police said a car operated by Carl Douglas Holly, 24, of 4917 South Pacific highway, Medford, was southbound on the highway and struck one cow. A log truck, operated by James Stanley Perdue, 26, route 1, box 32A, Medford, was northbound and struck the other cow.

Officers said the accident occurred during fog. Both cows sustained broken legs and were shot a short time after the accident. Neither driver was injured.

Glenn Edward Nelson, route 1, box 114, Eagle Point, and four passengers escaped injury. Monday night when their car struck a Medford Corporation log train at the Nick Young rd. crossing, state police said.

According to the report, Nelson's overhead lights failed to show the engine, 30 empty cars and caboose, through the fog. The vehicle hit the third car of the train. The Nelson car was reported extensively damaged. No damage to the train was reported.

The engineer was identified as Glenn Hickman, Eagle Point, and the conductor, Lloyd Breeding, Eagle Point. The accident occurred about 8:23 p.m.

Cars operated by Ralph C. Brumbaugh, 21, Talent, and Leslie John Shroy, 806 West Main st., Medford, were involved in an accident about 5:32 p.m. on Monday, one mile east of Ashland on Antelope rd. No citations were issued and no serious injuries were reported, police said.

Involved in a minor accident Saturday night on Highway 99 near Harry and David's Bear Creek orchard were Mrs. Doris Elizabeth Greene, 51, of 2476 Reed lane, Medford, and Terry W. Varga, 22, Yreka, Calif. According to state police, the cars collided when Varga changed lanes. No one was injured and no citations were issued.

Response Good From First-Aid Kit Sale

He added that only one out of every three homes is lacking in one or more of the first-aid essentials, and one out of five families owns a first-aid kit.

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
