Ducks Keep First Spot In Defense

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Passing wizard John Brodie of Stanford continued to dominate the total offense department in the Pacific Coast conference with 1,144 yards, the PCC commissioner's office announced today.

Brodie's total gave him a substantial lead over Bob Newman of Washington State with 788 yards and Jon Arnett of Southern California with 758. Arnett, however, ended his five game eligibility two weeks ago and didn't play last week end.

The Stanford star has completed 91 of 164 passes for 1,145 yards with 11 good for touchdowns. But Brodie has a minus 1-yard mark in the rushing department. Newman has 63 completions for 833 yards.

Despite remaining idle, Arnett held the rushing lead with 625 yards to 557 for teammate C. R. Roberts. Jack Morris of Oregon was third in rushing with 422. Arnett also heads the scoring with 44 points, followed by Lou Valli of Stanford with 42.

All top three pass receivers failed to catch a pass over the week end and as a result the standings remained unchanged. Bill Steiger of WSC leads with 26 for 376 yards to 24 and 317 yards for Paul Camera of Stanford and 22 for 313 yards for Norm Becker of California.

Southern California continued to increase its leadership in total offense while Oregon remained the leader in total defense. Southern California has averaged 370.7 total yards a game to 368.3 for Washington State.

The Trojans also lead in rushing with a 285.2 yard average to 276.1 for Washington. Oregon has given up 237.9 total yards on defense to 261.1 for UCLA. WSC boasts the best passing mark of 222.4 yards to 207.1 for Stanford.
