

# McKay Congratulates Morse on Victory

Portland—(U.P.)—Douglas McKay today conceded his defeat and said he had "wished my congratulations to Sen. Morse on his reelection."

McKay said: "I am deeply gratified at the tremendous vote of confidence expressed in the sweeping election of President Eisenhower. It is reassuring that this nation will have strong leadership in the difficult years ahead."

# Heavy Vote, Thick Fog Delay Tallies

A combination of what is probably a record heavy vote and a thick fog last night made the late compilation of election returns in Jackson county the slowest in years.

The number of voters—estimated at 86 or 87 per cent, and exceeding that in some precincts—slowed down the counting by election boards. And the fog hampered Mail Tribune-KJJC employees who inched their way from one polling place to another collecting returns and telephoning them to the newspaper office.

As the polls closed, returns came in rapidly for a time, the results compiled by the second shift in precincts which had double election boards. More than two-thirds of the precincts had been heard from by mid-evening.

But after that, returns stopped coming in as first-shift boards took over to compile the votes, cast later in the day.

By late morning today, some precincts still had not been heard from at the county clerk's office.

The voter turnout yesterday compares with a 78 per cent vote in 1952, the highest in a number of years.

# Anglo-French, Israel Removal In Egypt Demand

(Continued from Page One)  
Egypt observed the cease fire. Yet it was insisting that United Nations "policing" of the war zone was not possible until Anglo-French and Israeli troops left Egyptian soil.

Israel made clear that it intended to hang on to some of the Egyptian territory its Army had seized, very probably including the Gaza Strip. Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion said his country considered its 1949 armistice agreement with Egypt "irrevocably dead."

Israel, while adhering to the cease fire, declared she would not permit an international police force along her borders.

What Russia would do now was the biggest question of all. Muscovites flocked to the Egyptian embassy in Moscow following the radio broadcast of Egypt's appeal for outside volunteers. Peiping radio said 250,000 Chinese also had volunteered. How such volunteers would get to the Canal Zone was the catch.

**Troops Are Pledged**  
Twelve members of the United Nations have pledged troops to an international U.N. "police force" to move into Egypt. None of the big powers was involved except India and Canada. Two Communist nations, Romania and Czechoslovakia, filed offers today.

A U.N. official in Cairo said he expected the first elements of the international force to arrive within a week. Canadian Maj. Gen. E.L.M. Burns, named commander of the force, was negotiating with Egypt and Britain to fly to Cairo from Jerusalem.

# Snap Off Most Buds To Get Big Roses

Champaign, Ill.—(U.P.)—Snap off most of the rose buds on your rose bushes and leave a few individual flowers to become very large if you want big roses, a floriculture specialist suggests.

C. E. Ackerman, University of Illinois floriculturist, said large exhibition type roses are produced in this manner. If you leave only three or four buds, the flowers will be larger than if the roses are left to bloom in profusion.

To remove a bud, Ackerman said, hold the main shoot in one hand and grasp the bud stem in the other, then twist the bud stem quickly and snap it off.

# Soviets Throw Planes Into Hungary Battle

The Soviets threw airplanes into the battle today to bomb rebel radio stations. Most stations were quiet in face of the newest threat.

Almost nothing had been heard up until early morning from the underground radio stations which have provided almost the only non-Communist reports of fighting.

Whether they were silent to escape detection or already had been destroyed could only be guessed.

In Milan, Italy, the newspaper Italia said it had talked with a freedom radio transmitter from Budapest during the night, however.

**Battles Still Going**  
It said the rebels reported "battles are still going on in Budapest with many Soviet tanks and artillery firing on the city. Resistance continues in the Transtadt and Kobanya sections of the capital where there was a big operation in front of the brewery (brewery) in which 30 tanks, 20 big calibre guns and Soviet infantry took part."
