

Georgia Tech Least Scored On in 1956

New York—UP—The meeting of Georgia Tech and Tennessee on Saturday will pit the nation's best defensive unit in the past decade against the top scoring team in the past three years.

According to statistics released today by the NCAA service bureau, the Engineers from Georgia Tech are the least scored upon team thus far this year, a department they have led the last 10 years. And Tennessee, with a 31.3 point per game average, tops the nation's major teams in scoring.

During the past decade, Georgia Tech has allowed its opponents just 291 points in 104 regular-season games, or an 2.8 point average. Thus far this season the Engineers have given up an aggregate of 27 points, or 4.5 per game. Last year they led all major teams in this department with a 4.6 points per game average.

However, the Engineers are not so tight-fisted in permitting their opponents to move up and down the field. Last year they were 10th in yards allowed, while permitting the least scoring offense in the nation. Oklahoma's 3.2 figure is next in the points allowed department followed by Miami, Fla., 5.3, Tulso, 5.7 and Penn State, Baylor and Texas Christian, tied at 6.5 points.

Mississippi Leads

For the third straight week, Mississippi leads in total defense and pass defense while Navy is on top in rushing defense and Colorado A&M is the punting leader.

Mississippi's total defense average jumped from 149.5 to 160.4 to top the other major schools. Texas A & M jumped from 16th to second after allowing Arkansas only 82 yards, all on the ground.

Navy's line held Notre Dame to only 55 yards to take over in rushing defense. Boston College, East Carolina, Miami, Fla., Navy's average stands at 104.8, Miami at 100.2 and Boston College at 118.3.

The Colorado Aggies, who've been among the top kicking teams all season, finally took over the leadership on six punts that averaged 46.5 yards last week against Xavier, Ohio. Their season mark stands at 42.8 yards on 29 punts.

Eagle Point — A hefty aggregation which has made the successful transition from Class B six-man football to Class A-2 variety. That's a quick description of the Glide Wildcats, whom Eagle Point high will oppose in the play-off for the District 6 banner.

The Eagles go to Glide for a 2 p.m. encounter on Saturday. This has been Glide's first season in 11-man football. The Wildcats were six-man state runners-up in 1955. For the current campaign they are unbeaten in seven games and a tie with Sutherland. The Cats took the Umpqua-Valley loop tags last week when Douglas helped out by tripping Sutherland.

Big gun of the Glide club is Dick Smith, six-man All-American. A 192-pounder and fast, he runs from the left halfback slot and is the team's leading ground gainer and scorer. He can cross up the opposition, with his passing.

195-Pound Fullback

Wayne (Moose) Kennaday, 196, is the fullback. He's said to be slow but hits hard. Burt Baker, 160, is likely right half, with Curtis Cheron, 175, at quarter. Ends are Allen Smith, cousin to Dick, and Chuck Meracle, 155. Likely guards are Gary Eaton,

175, and Eldon Sinnott, 160, with Richard Harvey, 196, and Jim McCoy, 214, billed at tackles. Lenny Crow, 200, may be at center.

Others who should see considerable service are Bill Ewinne, 130 defensive safety, Johnny Livingston, 140, and Gary Wagner, 165, backs, and Dave Evans, 160, Larry Swanson, 170, and Paul Anderson, guards, 170.

That was the comment this morning of Coach Millard Webb concerning his St. Mary's high football club.

St. Mary's will go to Merrill on a 2 p.m. Saturday combat for the District 5B championship. It is the third straight year in the play-off for the Crusaders of Medford, Jackson county champions, Merrill undefeated Malin as Klamath county titlist.

Webb indicated by his words that St. Mary's morale is high, condition of the team good and that the Crusaders will be at their best this Saturday.

Against Merrill, the SM eleven will face a club which has a good defensive record despite overall lightness. The Huskies will be lighter on the line but heavier in the backfield than the Crusaders.

Merrill has a seven win, one loss standing for the season, compared to the five-two record of St. Mary's. The Husky setback was to Henley on a last minute touchdown. No team has scored more than one touchdown against Merrill this season. Prospects Poor For Waterfowl In Rogue Region

Portland—UP—Weekly fishing report prepared by the State Game Commission:

Southwest: Hunting — Waterfowl prospects poor in Jackson and Josephine counties; Coos county elk hunting fair with elk back in timber; duck hunting poor.

Fishing — Few steelhead and goodly number of cutthroat being taken in upper Umpqua and lower portion of north and south Umpqua; cluster eggs best; Rogue improved but steelheading slow.

Northwest: Hunting — Pheasants to be had in north Willamette area with dogs but hunting difficult; waterfowl scarce; waterfowl hunting fair for Lane county with pintails, baldpates and Canada geese observed in the valley; Pheasant prospects poor. Elk hunting spotty in Cascade area.

Fishing — North coast streams in good condition with alviers in most of them; few fresh run steelheads taken in larger streams.

Central: Hunting for waterfowl should be fair; quail hunting in Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties fair. Some fish being caught in Ochoco reservoir.

Northwest: Elk hunting improving in Onatilla area and elk moving down because of snow in Union, Baker and Wallowa areas; best prospects in Grant county rare in Desolation creek, Indian creek, Granite-Boulder creek and Camp and Silver creek areas; waterfowl fair to good.

Southeast: Pheasant hunting fair in Malheur county; waterfowl fair to good; upland game shooting poor in Harney county; about 40,000 geese remain in Warner Valley shooting grounds.
