Hungarian Patriots Continue To Fight

Vienna — (U.P.) — Diehard Hungarian patriots have renewed their fight against the Soviets in Budapest and opened a "third front" near the Yugoslav border, radio reports from Hungary said today.

Faint signals from a radio transmitter inside the ruined Hungarian capital served notice the rebel spirit had not been daunted by Soviet firepower.

"The freedom fighters are becoming tired, yet enthusiasm is even greater than before," the broadcast said. "Please help us save our country."

It added that they had food left for less than a week.

The broadcast followed other rebel reports the Soviets were expected to purge the new puppet Premier Janos Kadar for his failure to command the support of the Hungarian people.

Stocks Suffer One of Year's Worst Declines

Middle East oils were the first to rally. Royal Dutch came back two points after dropping 4 1/2. Gulf Oil recovered two of a 3 1/2 point loss.

Other sections met good demand at the lows but the buying was insufficient to bring prices all the way back.

Lincoln, Neb. — (U.P.) — Orla J. Wade, 65, will be a "ward" of the Nebraska government for another three years through the kindness of Lincoln police and District Judge John L. Polk.

Wade, recently released from the prison, found life rough on the outside with only a \$50-a-month pension and no friends.

So he wrote a worthless check for \$34.95 for purchase of a radio and promptly turned himself in.

Police obliged him by filing charges, and Polk gave him the three-year term after Wade explained it might be easier if he could get his old prison job back at 45 cents a day and work for three years to get a "nest egg."

Besides, he said, he's been living in prisons for 10 years anyhow.

Duff to Attend GP Hearing on Rogue

Eden Censure Motions Offered by Laborites

London — (U.P.) — The opposition Labor party introduced two censure motions on the government's Middle East policy today in an attempt to force Prime Minister Anthony Eden to resign.

There also has been considerable criticism of the Anglo-French attack on the Suez from sections of the British press and public.

The motions in both houses followed reports of disunity in Eden's cabinet and of dissension within the Tory ranks itself. Socialist circles said the moves are designed to test the strength of the reported anti-Eden movement within the Prime Minister's own party.

Engineer Executives Leading in Demand

Chicago — (U.P.) — Demand for engineering executives is leading the over-all management personnel market which is up 33 per cent over the last six months of 1955. Executives, a monthly survey of business positions, has reported.

Heidrick and Struggles, Chicago executive recruiting firm which conducts the survey, said the demand for executives this year is also up over the first six months of 1955—about one-sixth larger.

The survey is made on the basis of the number of management positions display-advertised in the ten most populated areas of the United States.

Behind engineering in second place for the most number of executive jobs open is marketing, which has fallen off seven per cent compared to January through June last year.

Next in order of number of jobs open come manufacturing, finance, personnel and general administration.
