Oakland, Calif. — (UP) — Mrs. Lila Jenkins, 21, Salt Lake City, a polio victim who has spent more than two months in an iron lung, gave birth Wednesday to a healthy daughter weighing 5 pounds 10 ounces.

Mrs. Jenkins left her iron lung for two hours while the baby was delivered. Attendants administered oxygen to her.

Mrs. Jenkins was flown to Highland Hospital here last

month for special care. Her husband, Wayne, 26, was at the hospital when the baby was born.

The couple's three other children, Peggy Ann, 4, Vickie Lee, 3, and Kay Lynn, 20 months, are with Jenkins' mother in Salt Lake City.

Attendants at the hospital said mother and daughter, Cindy Lee, were doing fine.
