Kansas City—Former President Truman on the results of Tuesday's balloting:

Small Businessmen May Get Tax Cut

Washington—(U.P.)—Some small businessmen may get a tax cut in the next session of Congress.

But there's little chance other taxpayers will get any tax relief next year unless the country is unexpectedly plunged into an economic recession.

The new Democratic Congress early next year will launch a big investigation into tax "loopholes." Democratic tax writers hope the inquiry will pave the way for a general reduction in income tax rates without unbalancing the budget.

Pollsters Close on Presidential Voting

New York—(U.P.)—The public opinion pollsters, burned in 1948 and running scared in 1952, let themselves go and came close to hitting the presidential vote on nose this week.

The last pre-election Gallup poll published showed President Eisenhower with 59.5 per cent of the popular vote to 40.5 per cent for Adlai E. Stevenson.

Elmo Roper showed a 57 per cent Eisenhower vote to a 38 per cent Stevenson vote, with 5 per cent undecided at last polling.

Today the returns showed Mr. Eisenhower with 61.2 per cent of the popular vote and Stevenson with 38.8.
