

# New Fighting Erupts in Budapest

## 'Many' Modern Jet Airplanes Spotted in Syria

Eden Announces Troop Regrouping

United Nations, N.Y.—(U.P.) Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld announced today that advance units of the U.N. police force would start for the Middle East "probably within 24 hours."

London—(U.P.)—"Dozens" of modern jet airplanes of unknown nationality have been spotted on Syrian and Saudi Arabian airfields, a French Foreign Ministry spokesman said today.

The French disclosure came amid a flurry of diplomatic and military developments which included a possible early Big Three meeting of British Prime Minister Anthony Eden and French Premier Guy Mollet with President Eisenhower in Washington.

**Forces Regrouping**

In the military field, Eden announced a regrouping of British Middle Eastern forces, and Israel prepared to pull her forces out of the Sinai Peninsula. A Jerusalem newspaper said Israel agreed to pull back her desert forces because of a threat of massed Soviet bombing attacks on Israel.

In Cairo, Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser breathed new defiance. He said the Suez Canal will not begin operating as long as there is "one single foreign soldier in Egypt."

**Iraq Takes Action**

"We want peace but surrender will not be imposed on us," he said.

He ridiculed claims that the Egyptian Air Force had been destroyed. He said planes the British and French claimed to have destroyed on the ground were "dummies."

In Baghdad, Iraq announced she was breaking relations with France and said she would no longer meet with Britain in the five-nation Baghdad defense pact.

The French Foreign Ministry spokesman said the planes sighted on Syrian and Saudi Arabian airfields "belonged neither to Syria nor Saudi Arabia."

**Possible Explanations**

"There are two possible explanations for the presence of those airplanes," he said. "Either they are Egyptian planes which escaped Egypt to seek refuge in friendly states, or they are planes sent in by a foreign power for unknown motives."

"It is also not impossible that the Soviet Union has sent volunteers to Syria and Saudi Arabia to aid them in case of need."

## Permits Required for Christmas Trees

Christmas tree cutters in Jackson and Josephine counties have been reminded that the Oregon state board of forestry requires a harvesting permit before trees are cut.

The permit is required under the Oregon forest conservation act to insure continued growth of timber on forest lands, and serves as a protection to the owner of land from which trees are harvested.

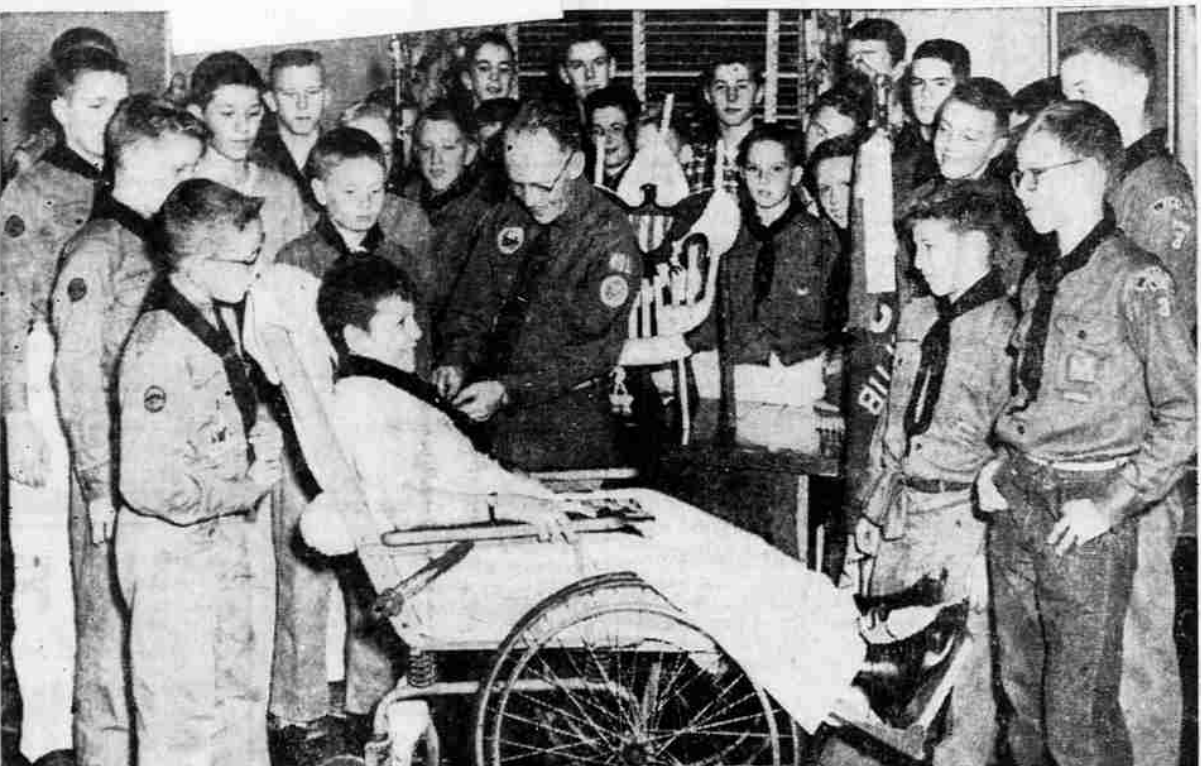

Gary Hankins' eyes sparkled today as he looked at his tenderfoot badge and reflected, "It sure feels good to be a Boy Scout."

Gary, 11, was taken into Scout Troop 3 at a special investiture ceremony in the social room of Sacred Heart hospital Tuesday night. He was injured last Feb. 28 in a shooting accident at his home in Dairy and was brought to the hospital here shortly afterwards. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Orrin Hankins.

His legs and left arm are still paralyzed from the accident. He was taken into the troop under a special Scout ruling for handicapped boys and he will be eligible to take part in any activities which his health and physical condition will permit.

Gary had expressed a desire to become a

Scout and an interested person reported his wishes to the local Scout office. He was assigned to Troop 3 because that troop is the nearest one to the hospital.

Carl Olson, Scoutmaster, and Jack Thompson, assistant, have been visiting Gary at the hospital recently to prepare him for the investiture. Several members of the troop also have been making periodic visits to the hospital to assist in the preparations.

## Police in Many Cities Gird for Outbursts Against Communism

Paris—(U.P.)—Police in many cities of the world girded today for possible new outbursts of violence by Communists and anti-Communists.

**Clash With Police**

More than 7,000 angry French Communists clashed with police in Paris Thursday night when the Reds staged a public protest meeting against an earlier attack on their party headquarters. Nearly 100 were injured and 222 were arrested.

In Vienna, screaming anti-Communists protesting the Soviet invasion of Hungary marched across the city and attacked Russian and satellite offices in an orgy of destruction.

More than 1,000 students stormed the Soviet Embassy in London, and students in Montevideo, Uruguay, attacked the Soviet Embassy there for the second night in a row.

**Five-Minute Strike**

Workers in the Philippines staged a five-minute strike Thursday in protest against the Soviet action in Hungary, and the Indonesian Parliament put pressure on the government to condemn the "aggression" in Hungary. Reports said left wing mass rallies were planned in two Indonesian cities this week end to protest the Anglo-French invasion of Egypt, and some organizations urged that the Hungarian situation be included.

**Vatican Urges UN To Order Cease Fire**

Vatican City—(U.P.)—The Vatican City newspaper Osservatore Romano today urged the United Nations to call a cease fire in Hungary with the same speed the assembly showed in the case of the Middle East fighting.

"It will be an ultimatum of civilization," the Osservatore Romano said.

## Bids for Canals in Talent Project Are Called for Dec. 18

Bids for construction of two canals in the Talent project will be received by the bureau of reclamation until 10 a.m. Tuesday, Dec. 18, according to J. A. Callan, project construction engineer, Camp White.

Bids will be for construction of the Howard Prairie delivery canal and the Soda Creek feeder canal. Bids for the Howard Prairie dam will be received by the bureau of reclamation until 10 a.m. Nov. 27 at the Camp White office.

The Howard Prairie delivery canal will carry water from the reservoir in the Cascades south and west through a tunnel to the west side of the Cascade divide and into Emigrant reservoir.

The project consists of earthwork for about 11.8 miles of canal, concrete lining in all canal sections, earthwork for and construction of about one-half mile of 48-inch diameter precast concrete pipe siphon, earthwork for a 400-foot long diversion dam 13 feet high, and earthwork for and construction of concrete structures and a timber bridge.

The canal will pick up water from other creeks between Howard Prairie reservoir and Emigrant reservoir. Water in the canal also will provide electric power at a Green Springs power and penstock site.

The canal will be completed in about 690 days after the contract is awarded. Plans and specifications are expected to be ready for mailing about Nov. 15. They may be obtained from Callan at Camp White or from the bureau of reclamation offices in Boise and Denver.

Prospective bidders desiring to visit the site may make arrangements by contacting Callan.

## Democrats Pledge Unbiased Support In World Crisis

Washington—(U.P.)—Democratic congressional leaders today pledged "responsible" bipartisan support to President Eisenhower in coping with the "very serious" world situation.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson announced the pledge after a 2½ hour White House conference at which Mr. Eisenhower and his top aides gave congressional leaders of both parties an up to date report on developments in the Middle East and Eastern Europe.

"It's obviously a very serious situation," Johnson told reporters. He said "no commitments were asked or given" at the bipartisan conference. But on behalf of the Democrats, he promised:

"We will give responsible consideration to all suggestions from the administration. We will not play politics with the foreign situation."

Johnson made it clear that the Democrats were not making a blank-check promise to do anything the administration asked, but rather to "do what we think is best for America" without regard to politics.

The bipartisan meeting was Mr. Eisenhower's first move to rebuild a strong basis of national political unity following Tuesday's elections in which the voters overwhelmingly handed him a second term but gave the Democrats control of Congress.

## Large Unemployment Increase Result of Recent Storm Series

Snow and rain brought the first large increase in unemployment this season in Jackson county during October, according to John Patton, manager of the Medford employment office.

Snow at higher elevations and heavy rains in lower levels hindered logging operations, he said, and some sawmills either laid off shifts or closed down until conditions became more favorable. He added that the pattern is a familiar one which occurs each year when the first bad weather arrives.

"Many of the people affected will get back to work soon," Patton said, "but unemployment generally can be expected to increase steadily from now through February."

## Tree Pruning

Fruit tree pruning will not start until leaves are off the trees, he said, and a demand for pruners is expected once leaves are off.

The job outlook for the next 60 days is for little new hiring, Patton said. Christmas gift box packing appeared to be the only industry hiring workers at the end of October, and the peak in packing will continue until about mid-December. Retail trade in November is expected to add seasonal help to accommodate Christmas shoppers.

Also attending sessions in Portland next week will be Mrs. Bereth P. Hopkins, county clerk, who will attend a state clerk's meeting, and Paul Rynning, county engineer and surveyor, who will attend a state engineers and surveyors session.

They will return to offices here the following week.

## E. G. Nye Low Bidder On National Timber

Emergy G. Nye of Prospect was high bidder Wednesday on 6,800,000 board feet of timber in the Willow creek drainage of the Rogue River National forest, Jack Wood, forest supervisor, has announced.

Nye's bid was \$197,070. Seven qualified bidders submitted 72 oral bids at the auction.

The timber includes an estimated 3,000,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine, and 3,800,000 board feet of white fir and other species, and consists of a single partial-cut unit of about 320 acres.

Most of the timber marked for cutting is either damaged by beetles or infested with mistletoe, Wood said.

## Red Cross Aid Must Be Channeled Through Yugoslavia

Rebels in Old City Launch New Attacks

Vienna—(U.P.)—The Hungarian Reds announced that fierce new fighting erupted in hazy Budapest today. They announced they would accept Western Red Cross aid provided it is channeled through Communist Yugoslavia.

The "Communist" controlled Budapest radio broadcast an announcement by the official Hungarian MTI news agency that the Soviet sponsored government of puppet Premier Jozsef Kadar has accepted offers of aid from the International Red Cross.

But it added that this would be allowed into the battle-torn country only if it is sent through Yugoslavia with guarantees that it contains no weapons or "agents" of exiled rightist former Hungarian Regent Adm. Nicholas Horthy.

The Soviets have charged that "Horthy agents" and arms were sent to the Hungarian rebels through the Red Cross. The MTI announcement appeared to be designed to press this propaganda allegation while at the same time taking advantage of desperately needed Western medical aid and food.

The International Red Cross is organizing in Vienna a convoy of trucks from a number of Western nations.

**New Battles Reported**

Earlier announcements by the Budapest radio said the rebels bled up in the narrow streets of the old city near the former royal palace had launched new attacks on the Soviet forces. Other fighting raged on both sides of the Danube and fire raged through the vast Hotel Royal two days after the Reds had claimed complete victory.

Hungarians in Milan, Italy, claimed to have heard a "freedom" station claiming that at least 60,000 Hungarians have been killed in the struggle since Sunday.

This broadcast claimed that Budapest's 14th district was burning fiercely and that fighting continued in the cloth district. It also claimed that 7,000 Hungarians died at Danapentele and that fighting continued at Gyver, Stryon and at the Tata-vian coal mines.

The broadcast allegedly heard in Milan was not heard elsewhere.

**Rumors About Cardinal**

The Budapest radio broadcast an announcement denying that members of the former Imperial government had been arrested.

The broadcast also denied rumors, apparently circulating in Budapest, that Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty has been rearrested. It did not say when he is, but the U.S. State Department early this week said he had been given refuge in the U.S. Legation in Budapest.

State police said logs will be permitted to be hauled Monday since the holiday actually is Sunday. Veterans Day is one of several legal holidays when log hauling is prohibited.

The Army has announced that a new song, "The Army Goes Rolling Along," will be dedicated in Army installations Veterans Day. The song is based on the artillery's "The Caissons Go Rolling Along" by the late Brig. Gen. E. L. Gruber with lyrics adapted by Dr. Harold W. Arberg of the adjutant general's office.

## McAllister Grateful For Write-in Votes

Salem—(U.P.)—Justice William McAllister, Medford, today expressed his gratitude to the people of Oregon for electing him to a full term on the State Supreme Court.

"It is particularly gratifying to note that such a large number of citizens took the trouble to vote by writing in the name of a candidate," McAllister said. "It demonstrates a fine sense of responsibility upon the part of the voters."

WINS COUNCIL POST—L. VanSickle, 53 Myers court, was elected to the Medford city council, defeating Mrs. Marina Gates by two votes. The vote was 602 for VanSickle and 590 for Mrs. Gates. A special count of the ballots were made by election department officials today.



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## Russia Asked To Permit Food, Medicine in Hungary

United Nations, N.Y.—(U.P.)—The United States, refusing to admit that Hungary's "glorious dead have died in vain," called on Russia today to permit food and medicines from abroad to be distributed to the Hungarian people.

U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. told the U.N. General Assembly that Russia had halted legitimate Red Cross activities in the beleaguered country.

"The action of the Soviet government, which speaks of sending food, and, on the other hand, is starving out the populace, is utterly revolting," Lodge said.

He presented a resolution calling on Russia to end its action against the Hungarian people and urging the Soviet Union and Hungary not to interfere with the receipt and distribution of food and medical supplies.
