Successors To Clements, Millikin Bring Speculation

Washington — (U.P.) — Political speculation centered today around possible successors to Sen. Earle C. Clements of Kentucky as Senate Democratic whip and Sen. Eugene D. Millikin of Colorado as chairman of the Conference of Republican Senators.

The Democrats were assured of control of the new 85th Senate when it convenes in January. But several top spots in the organizational structure remain to be filled by one or both parties.

Clements, the foremost Senate casualty in the voting Tuesday, served as a strong number two man to Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) and several times had filled in as acting Democratic leader.

The veteran Kentucky political leader went down to narrow defeat at the hands of former Republican Rep. Thurston B. Morton, who resigned as an assistant secretary of state to make the race.

The ailing Millikin, chairman of the GOP conference caucus for 10 years, retired because of poor health. Former Democratic Rep. John A. Carroll won his seat.

Sen. Carl Hayden (D-Ariz.), a 79-year-old veteran, is in line to become president pro tempore. He would succeed Sen. Walter F. George (D-Ga.) who is retiring after 34 years in the upper chamber. Hayden, who has been in Congress since 1912, also becomes "dean" of the Senate in length of service.

Hungry Arabs Storm UN Food Center; Guards Open Fire

Gaza — (U.P.) — Thousands of hungry Arab refugees stormed a United Nations food center and troops had to fire over their heads to regain control, United Press Correspondent Pat Herman reported today.

Miss Herman said mobs of Arab men, women and children pushed against the barbed wire enclosure of the food center in this Israeli-held sector Thursday and some shoved their way into the compound, crying for food.

Arabs Fall To Ground
Israeli guards raised their rifles and fired into the air. The Arabs fell to the ground, shouting and moaning, then rose and started the clamor again as the echo of the shots died away.

Lt. Henri Ehrenburg, member of a UN food distribution team, said the near-riot was touched off by a rumor that the Israeli occupation troops intended to let the refugees starve.

"The war has interrupted the normal distribution of rations for several days," Ehrenburg said. "Now they're terrified they won't get any more food."

However, foodshop personnel said there is now a six-weeks supply of rations on hand and that homeless Arabs will be fed under UN supervision in the normal manner.

building, threatened today to topple into a heavily-populated residential area.

Four and possibly five persons were killed when the twin-engine Beechcraft plane struck the fog-shrouded tower Thursday and careened into the top floor of the apartment house. The plane tore a 75-foot gash in the top of the 36-family building and fire gutted the fifth floor. Four persons were injured.

Mayor Angelo Sarubbi said engineers would attempt today to cut the top of the tower free with acetylene torches and remove it in "a directed drop." The freed part would be directed in its fall by guide wires.

State of Emergency
Sarubbi declared a state of emergency and ordered all persons evacuated from a 15 square

block area in North Bergen and nearby Buttenberg.

Some 3,000 persons were evacuated and sought shelter with relatives, in nearby schools

Monmouth Infant Burned in Crib

Salem — (U.P.) — Ann Helen Livingston, 14-month old daughter of Oregon College basketball Coach Bob Livingston, was severely burned yesterday in an accident at her Monmouth home. She was "holding her own nicely" in a local hospital today.

The girl suffered first and second degree burns after she apparently jiggled her crib next to an electric heater, causing it to catch fire. Her twin brother, Donald, who was in another crib, was overcome by smoke. He was released from the hospital.

The Red Cross declared the section a disaster area and provided food and shelter for the homeless. An Army truck from First Army Headquarters in New York delivered blankets and cots early today to the schools.

The pilot and co-pilot of the plane, both killed, were identified as William Lee Cromley, 32, of Trafalgar, Ind., and Russell S. Williams Sr., 58, Indianapolis, president of the Bonded Gasoline and Oil Company of Indianapolis. The plane was owned by Gasteria, Inc., of Indianapolis.

Two women who lived on the top floor of the building also were killed.

Widow's Body Found
The body of Mrs. Estelle Pyne, a widow, was found in the gutted building. Her body was identified through dental work

by Dr. Benjamin Moskowitz, a Union City, N.J., dentist.

Mrs. Harriet Phelps, 58, jumped to her death from the window of her top floor apartment to

escape the flames. The possibility that a fifth person might have been killed was raised when police said they discovered a "small body" in

the apartment house. They said this might be the body of a child but it was burned beyond recognition.

Police said the pilot, apparently lost in the fog, may have been trying to land the plane in a nearby park. They said if the plane had been 15 feet higher after it struck the tower it would have cleared the

apartment house and crashed in the park. One engine hurtled into a garage behind the Immaculate Heart of Mary Chapel School in which 250 children are enrolled. A group of children returning to school from lunch were in the yard when the accident happened. The other engine buried itself in the ground.

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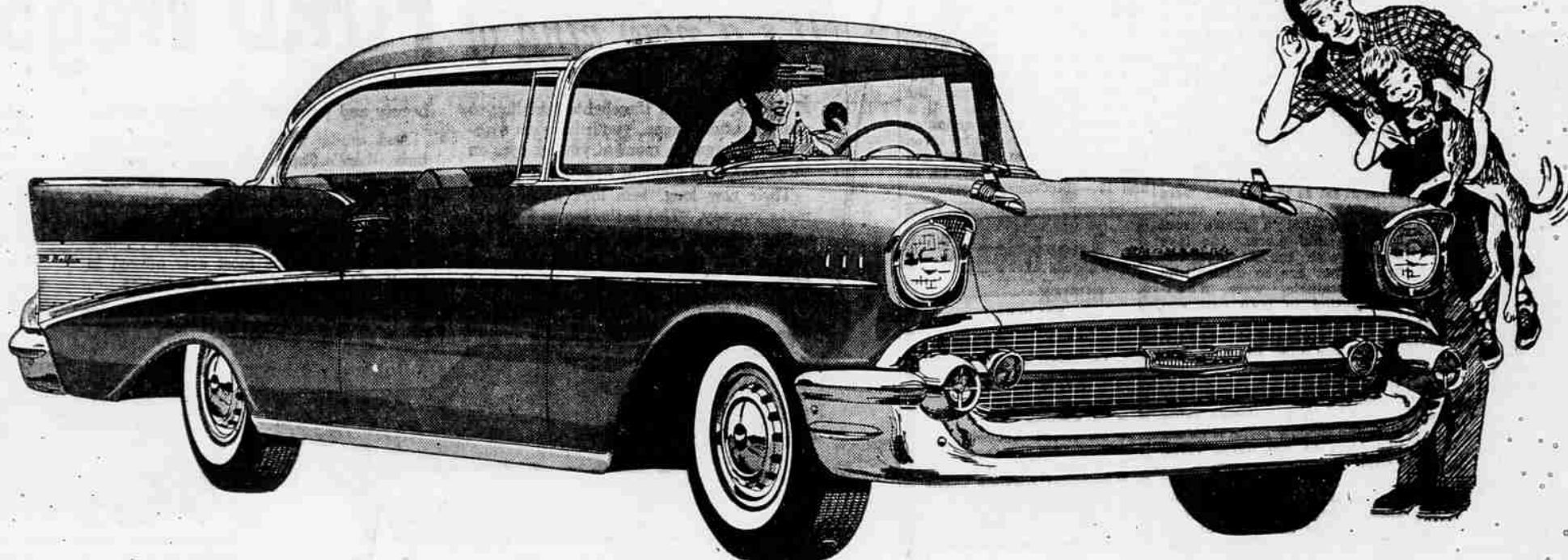
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
