

Crusaders Await 5B Titular Engagement

St. Mary's high of Medford finished its last hard drill of the week last night and today awaited its encounter for the District 5B crown against a club which is short on weight but long on hustle and spirit and which boasts strong passing and good defense.

The Crusaders of Jackson county go to Merrill for a 2 p.m. Saturday game. Two seasons back St. Mary's wrestled the district banner in a conflict with Malin. Last year Malin won back the honor. And, now the Crusaders are seeking the toga again against the club which knocked Malin out of the running for the Klamath County B league championship.

Medford's parochial school graders hope to combat the Husky spirit with some high morale of their own. And, Coach Millard Webb has expressed his confidence that his club will produce. He has pointed to improvement of the Crusaders in the late season and to desire so high that he has had trouble getting squad members away from the practice field.

The SM club has been looking good in drills and appears to be in top shape. Webb reported, adding, "I think they will be at their best." Preparations this week have stressed heavy blocking and tackling work along with the particular moves to meet the expected Merrill offense and defense.

Situations Reversed
Merrill likely will field a club that in the line but with good weight in the backfield. St. Mary's will be the reverse with good bulk up front and a healthy

handful of light but shifty and speedy backs.

The two teams have met three common foes, and their respective successes are inconclusive in throwing light on the outcome of the play-off fray. St. Mary's last 7 to 13 to Sacred Heart which Merrill licked 33 to 6. Merrill nipped Talent 7 to 6 and SM turned the trick by 14 to 12. Against Rogue River the Crusaders won 49 to 7 and the Huskies 33 to 6.

Chicago — (U.P.) — A 21-year-old former college student who liked to carry a gun to classes died Thursday in a blind alley gunfight with police trying to arrest him for a clothing store robbery.

Larry Stallings Mock, former University of Illinois sophomore from Robinson, Ill., was shot and killed after a chase by three taxi drivers and police on Chicago's North Side.

The youth left the university — where he was said to have liked to carry a gun to his journalism classes — about mid-October because he "didn't like it." He had been living here in the plush Drake and Edgewater Beach hotels.
