

Oregon Parks Attract More Visitors in '56

Portland — (U.P.) — National parks and monuments in Oregon, Washington and Idaho attracted seven per cent more visitors during the first nine months of 1956 than during the corresponding period of 1955, the Interior Department said today.

Parks at which tourist records were kept showed that 2,367,364 persons were visitors during January through September this year. That compares with 2,206,038 tourists who visited the same parks in the same nine months of 1955.
