



## Oregon Balloting Sets Record With 84.2 Per Cent at Polls

Complete returns from Oregon's 2332 voting precincts reveal that 84.2 per cent of the eligible voters in the state cast ballots in Tuesday's general election. In the 1952 presidential election, the percentage was 81.2.

A total of 738,958 votes were cast for the presidential candidates, highest vote ever cast in the state.

Reflecting the new Democratic complexion of Oregon politics was the victory margin accorded President Eisenhower against Democrat Adlai Stevenson. The President's lead was less than half that he won in 1952 in Oregon against the same opponent.

Holmes to Move Slowly

Governor-elect Robert Holmes has indicated that he will move slowly in transferring the state administration from Republican to Democratic hands.

"I know that thousands of conscientious citizens are helping Oregon and I want them to continue," he said. But he added, "In some areas I will have suggestions for change."

Since the gubernatorial election was to fill the unexpired term of the late Paul L. Patterson, who died in January, Holmes will serve only a two-year term and would have to face the voters again in November, 1958, to earn a full four-year term. Gov. Elmo Smith will have held office just short of a year when he steps out of the executive office on the opening day of the legislative session next January. Holmes will take over officially after the November vote and he is sworn in by the Chief Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

**Demos Have House**

While control of the 1957 Senate remains in doubt, due to a 15-15 split of the membership between the parties, Democrats will have undisputed control of the House. Rep. Pat Dooley, the only Democrat to be elected in his Multnomah county sub-district, appeared to be the leading candidate for presiding officer of the House.

In the Senate, Warren Gill of Lebanon has made an all-out bid to retain Republican control in announcing his candidacy for Senate presidency. Considered foremost Democratic candidates are Monroe Sweetland of Milwaukie, Harry Boivin of Klamath Falls and Phil Brady of Portland.

Vacancies in the Senate left by election of Holmes and Mark Hatfield to the executive branch will be filled by appointment by Clatsop and Marion county commissioners, respectively. Since the appointments must be made from the same party as the vacating members, the party alignments would be unchanged. Hatfield will leave the Senate to become secretary of state.

In Congress, Oregon will have the heaviest Democratic representation in 75 years with both Senate seats and three out of four House seats. Only veteran congressman Walter Norblad will return to a seat on the Republican side of the aisle on Capitol Hill. Sens. Wayne Morse and Richard Neuberger and Rep. Edith Green will return to familiar quarters in Washington while Charles Porter and Al Ullman join the ranks of freshman lawmakers.

## 10 Per Cent Hike in State Residents Seen Within Next Decade

Pendleton — (U.P.) — Oregon's population, both urban and rural, will increase more than 10 per cent in the next 10 years, but it will still produce more farm produce including wheat than it can consume, in the opinion of Dr. Gerald Korzan, head of the agriculture department at Oregon State College.

Dr. Korzan told some 350 members attending the annual convention of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation yesterday: "Our production of all farm products and particularly wheat is going to fill this population demand and still leave tremendous surpluses." He added:

"We should seriously consider channeling some of the surplus food stockpiles into feed for cattle and other livestock. The present practice is to cut down on pasture roughage for animals and sell them for human consumption. But in order to keep a sufficient supply of meat it is necessary to feed livestock more than they eat in field grazing."

**Boon To Oregon**

Dr. Korzan touched briefly on the atomic radiation method of preserving foodstuffs. He said this will be a "great boon" to Oregon products. Most of them have to be shipped across country at a loss usually of quality and at high transportation expense.

## Moves by Cabinet Save Eden From Fatal Party Split

London — (U.P.) — Only last minute moves by cabinet ministers averted open rebellion in Conservative Party ranks and saved Prime Minister Anthony Eden's government from a fatal split over its Middle East policy, it was disclosed today.

As a result of the intervention, the government defeated a Laborite motion of censure Thursday night in the House of Commons. The motion was beaten by 320 to 262, a majority of 58.

Eden himself did not participate in the debate which preceded the vote. But he is expected to speak today. Informants said he may announce British forces will be withdrawn from Egypt within 10 days.

**Critical for Eden**

The censure vote was considered critical for Eden in view of the recent defections of Conservative backbenchers. Two of his state ministers had resigned in protest against the armed intervention in Egypt. So did his public relations secretary.

Authoritative political reports said a large number of Conservatives—estimated at nearly 30—announced their intention to obtain from the vote. Some said they would refuse to vote until they received assurances that British forces would be withdrawn as soon as the United Nations police force arrived in Egypt.

## Like Orders Borders Open To Hungarians

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower has ordered the United States opened to 5,000 refugees who fled from Hungary rather than submit to Communist domination.

The present U.S. immigration quota for Hungary is 865.

Mr. Eisenhower announced the lowering of immigration barriers after a conference Thursday with Pierce J. Gerety, deputy administrator of the refugee relief act. He also issued a public appeal to all Americans to give assurances of "housing, employment and financial assistance" for Hungarians seeking to escape Russian bullets and bombs.

The 5,000 refugees will be admitted to this country as soon as possible, the President said.

Mr. Eisenhower said in a special statement that "few events of recent times have so stirred the American people as the tragic effort of Hungarian men and women to gain freedom for themselves and for their children."
