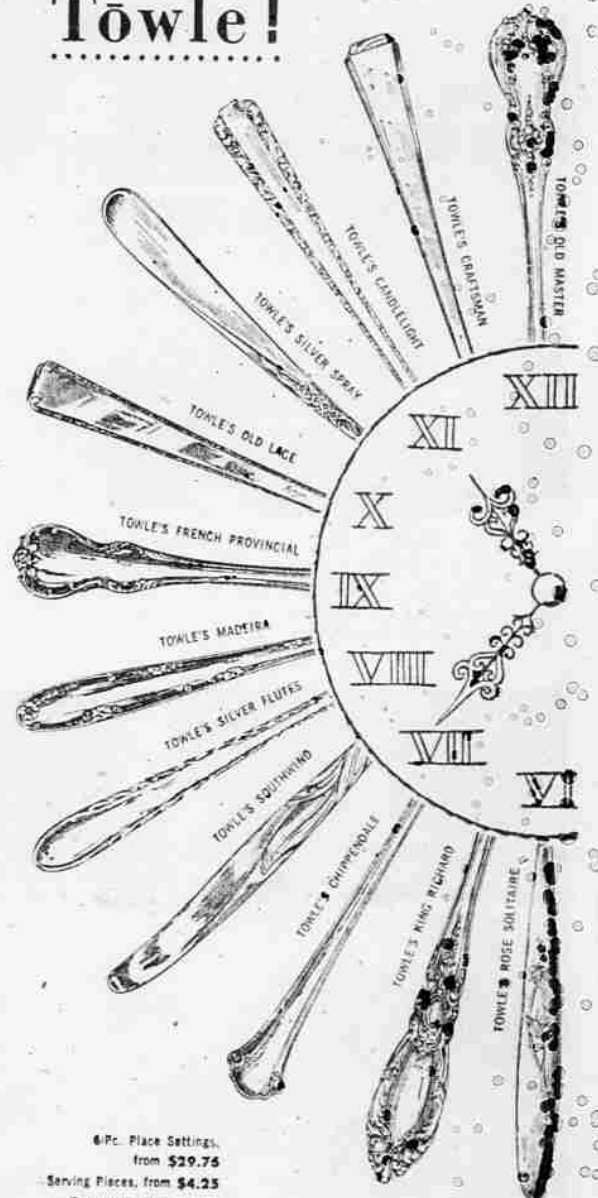
Plan Smorgasbord
