

Memorial Hospital Auxiliary Reviews Work of Past Year

A total of 4345 hours of volunteer work was done for Rogue Valley Memorial Hospital auxiliary during the past twelve months, according to a report issued by Mrs. Shelby M. Tuttle, president. About 35 women met in the hospital penthouse Wednesday afternoon to hear the second annual report covering the year ending in October.

The auxiliary, which was organized two years ago, now has a membership of 81 volunteers, of whom 61 are "active," 18 "inactive," and two associate members, Mrs. Tuttle points out. In addition to the five service groups which were formed during the first year of operation, a surgical supply group has been added. This unit meets each Thursday morning at the hospital and makes surgery supplies under the direction of Mrs. Berice W. Nims, director of nurses, and Mrs. Walter Nelson, surgery supervisor.

Two "outlying chapters" have assumed projects for the auxiliary, and expansion of the chapter services is planned, according to the president. Each group includes several auxiliary members. St. Martha's guild of Prospect has completed 250 hand puppets, which are being given to child patients. Members of Jackson County Public Health association unit of Gold Hill have made 16 bedside bags, and are making 66 more.

The estimate of hours given by each service group includes 305 hours spent in caring for flowers and delivering mail, 585 hours in hospital sewing, 273 hours preparing surgical supplies, 484 hours operating hos-
