

Oregon State Cinches Rose Bowl Bid with 20-19 Upset over Stanford

Beavers Surge Back After Trailing 19-7

Durden, Lowe and Francis Responsible for OSC Come Back; Iowa Possible Rose Bowl Opponent

Stanford, Calif. —UP—Oregon State's inspired Beavers, a joke in football circles only two years ago, stormed from behind in the last period Saturday to collar favored Stanford 20-19 and virtually clinch a bid to the Rose Bowl before a crowd of 63,000.

Coach Tommy Prothro's single wing club trailed the Indians 19-7 as the final quarter opened but pulled the game out thanks to some great running by wingback Earnel Durden and tailback Paul Lowe, mixed in with some fancy work by tailback Joe Francis of Honolulu.

For the second week in a row Stanford lost because of missed conversions. Last week UCLA dumped the Indians 14-13 and

today Doug Dick missed the points after the first two touchdowns. John Clarke kicked the extra points after OSC's first two tallies and they turned out to be the points the Beavers needed.

The Beavers, who probably will meet Iowa for the second time this season if they make the almost certain trip to Pasadena, went ahead midway in the period when Francis connected on a 21-yard pass to end Frank Negri for the clinching tally. That pulled Oregon State up to the fore from a 14-19 deficit and climaxed a 57-yard touchdown march which opened after Tom Berry intercepted a pass by Stanford's John Brodie.

OSC Washed Up

Oregon State had seemed about washed up after Stanford moved ahead 19-7 with a little less than two minutes to play in the third period after Gordy Young smashed over for the Indians third tally and Brodie passed to Carl Isaacs for their first conversion of the day.

But then the fired up club, which has turned from Pacific Coast conference doormat into a hot contender since Prothro checked in two years ago, went to work with a vengeance and driving them all the time was end Norm Thiel, who played a solid game on defense and continually red dogged the fancy passing Brodie.

Durden, who had been the key in Oregon State's first quarter drive, that gave the Beavers a 7-0 lead over Stanford before the game was five minutes old, grabbed a pass from Lowe and raced 50 yards down the sidelines to the enemy 15 as the third period ran out. Lowe, a former champion high school hurdler from Los Angeles, then scrambled 10 yards through a maze of red shirts from the touchdown that put the Beavers back into business. John Clarke converted to make the score 14-19 and set the stage

UCLA Takes 13-9 Victory Over Huskies

Seattle, Wash. —UP—Third string halfback Kirk Wilson, backed up by smashing defense, led the UCLA Bruins to a 13-9 Pacific Coast conference victory over Washington Saturday before 27,500 fans.

Wilson, a sophomore from Los Angeles, came off the bench in the second period to pace the Bruins in their game-winning touchdown drive that was capped when Wilson passed to end Hal Smith in the end zone less than two minutes before half-time.

The drive went 48 yards in five plays and Wilson accounted for every foot.

Washington made a spectacular last period effort to force home a score when they smashed right down the middle for 46 yards, but they changed their tactics by going to the air and the cause was lost.

for the final drive. After Oregon State had gone ahead for keeps, Francis ruined any chance the Indians had for staging a counter attack when he got off a 49 yard punt that rolled dead on the Stanford three with less than a minute and a half to play.

Brodie Brilliant
Brodie was brilliant in defeat, however, connecting on 19 of 31 passes for a total of 223 yards.

It was the gawky quarterback's passes that were the drive wheel in all three Stanford touchdowns, which carried for 59, 80 and 43 yards. Brodie bootlegged three yards for the

second Indian tally of the day while fullback Lou Valli and Young accounted for the first and third markers from close up.

Francis also scored Oregon State's initial touchdown after Durden had lugged the ball 46 yards on three attempts against Stanford's surprised defenders.

Oregon State has much defeated Idaho and traditional Oregon left on its PCC schedule, blemished so far only by the University of Southern California. USC beat the Beavers 21-13 in Los Angeles. Oregon's only other loss was to Iowa when the Hawkeyes won 14-13 at Iowa City.

WSC Makes Up Deficit In 4th Period, Ties UO

Eugene, Ore. —UP—Washington State and Oregon played to a 7-7 standoff here Saturday before 13,200 homecoming fans as the Cougars came from behind to tie the game on a 79-yard pass play in the fourth quarter.

Bill Steiger took a short pitch from Bob Newman on the third play of the fourth quarter and then outlegged three Webfoot backs for 79 yards to score and Ron Hare knotted the count for good with a wobbly placement which barely cleared the cross bar.

The Ducks had two additional scoring opportunities, but one died on an intercepted pass deep in Cougar territory and the second ended when Crabtree was dumped for a five yard loss from the Cougar 17 and Morris was short with a field goal try which would have needed 38 yards to clear the cross bar.

U.S. Cuppers Show Poor

Sydney —UP—United States Davis Cup players made a poor showing Saturday at the new South Wales tennis championships when Sam Giammalva was eliminated and Herb Flam trailed an unheralded Australian when darkness halted his match. Giammalva of Houston, Tex., was seeded second among overseas players in the tournament but bowed to Roy Emerson of Australia, 7-5, 6-4, 6-2. The third-round victory put the 20-year-old Emerson into the quarter-finals, where he'll meet teammate Neale Fraser.

Southern Cal Notches 20-7 Win Over Cal

Los Angeles —UP—Tiny Ernie Zampese picked up Saturday where All-American halfback Jon Arnett left off when his five games were up by sparking University of Southern California to a 20 to 7 victory over California under a blazing sun in Memorial Coliseum before 41,628 fans.

The Trojans spotted California a 7-0 halftime lead and then roared back to capitalize on a blocked punt and a pass interception in the second half to overtake the Bears and move ahead, adding an insurance touchdown late in the fourth period.

The Homecoming crowd of Trojans roared approval as Zampese raced back an interception 30 yards in the fourth period to set up the second Southern California touchdown. Then he threw a 58-yard scoring pass to halfback Tony Ortega to sew up the game.

Coach Jess Hill, who never in his six years at Southern Cal has lost to Coach Pappy Waldorf's California eleven, sent his Trojans on the field in a temperature of 102 degrees, but for the first half it was the home team that wilted while California showed a smooth offense. Then the heat and Trojan pressure got the California Bears in the second half.

Fumbles Assist Wyoming to Win

Billings, Mont. —UP—A pair of fumbles, one in each half, and a partially-blocked punt helped the University of Wyoming to a 34-13 football victory Saturday over a stubborn Montana State University team.

The victory for the unbeaten cowboys left only Brigham Young University, scheduled next weekend, in the way of Wyoming's second perfect grid season in history.

VILLANOVA REBOUNDS
Philadelphia —UP—Villanova university, rebounding from two straight defeats, mauled the Citadel, 46-0, in its first appearance of the season on the home campus Saturday with fullback Rollie West leading a fumble-filled scoring parade with two touchdowns.
