Hurricane Season Among Mildest; Cost Set at \$57,314,000

Miami — (U.P.) — The 1956 hurricane season was one of the mildest in the past 15 years but it still cost at least 74 lives and \$57,314,000 in property damage, the Weather Bureau has reported.

The tropical storm season ends officially Nov. 15 when the far-flung reporting stations, stretching from the windward islands on the eastern edge of the Caribbean to Eastport, Me., and around the Gulf of Mexico coast to Yucatan, shut down until next June 15. The rush of cold air southward over the past week end meant the end of any more hot-blooded tropical twists this year.

Eight Disturbances

The Weather Bureau classified eight disturbances as tropical storms this year. Only four built up winds of hurricane intensity — 75 miles per hour or better. In the past 15 years, only in 1951 and 1952, have there been fewer tropical storms and the average is 10 storms per year for the past 20 years.

Only two storms reached the U.S. mainland and neither was classified as severe.

The biggest and most severe blow of the year was the hurricane Greta which spun itself out over the Atlantic Nov. 6 without its 135 mile an hour winds ever coming close to land. But high tides and ocean swells kicked up by Greta did more than \$1 million worth of damage in the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Hispaniola and some moderate flooding damage along the south-east Florida coast.

Betsy Killer Storm

The year's "killer" storm was hurricane Betsy which piled into the French West Indies, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands with 100 mile an hour winds on Aug. 11-12, leaving 40 dead and \$35,600,000 in property damage. Luckily, Betsy turned back out to sea just off the Florida Coast and passed harmlessly northward between Cape Hatteras, N. C., and Bermuda.

The 31-year-old bassoon player presented "an extravagant evening of symphonic caricatures" to a jammed audience in the big music hall. It was music of a strange sort. Some listeners said it wasn't even music.

The serious musicians—as all of them were—set out to put some fun in music. They did it with a varied selection of "musical" instruments that produced the loudest and craziest rendering of any composition ever heard in this city.
