

Oregon Democrats Schedule Caucus

Portland — (UP) — Democrats injected to the Oregon Legislature will caucus in Portland Saturday to lay the groundwork for their assumption of control of much of the state government next January.

The general election gave the Democrats the executive office, control of the House of Representatives and an even split with Republicans in the Senate.

Democratic State Chairman Robert A. Boyer called the caucus for 10 a.m. Saturday and said he hoped to settle intra-party rivalry before the move to Salem in two months.

The Democrats have three avowed candidates for speaker of the House—Reps. Pat Dooley of Portland, Robert Klemm of St. Helens, and George Annala of Hood River.

In the Senate, a 15-15 tie vote between the parties could stall organization of that chamber where Republican Warren Gill and Democrats Monroe Sweetland and Walter Pearson appeared to be leading contenders for the presidency. Governor-elect Robert Holmes could not be inaugurated until the Senate is organized.

Questions Concerning Election Discussed By Republican Women

What happened? Why? What to do? These were questions concerning the general election discussed when Jackson County Republican Women met yesterday at the Jackson hotel.

Mrs. Frank Bash, chairman of the Republican party for Jackson county, opened the panel discussion. She prefaced her remarks by stressing that opinions expressed by speakers and other members at the luncheon were their personal beliefs and not to be considered as official pronouncements of the party.

Taking "What Happened" as her topic, Mrs. Bash reviewed President Eisenhower's "smashing victory" and then added that in many other instances, the results of the election "did not make sense." She pointed out that only once before had the nation elected a president and vice president of one party and a congress predominately of another.

Mrs. Bash said it was believed the Middle East crisis had helped Eisenhower; she pointed out that even though the AFL-CIO had endorsed Stevenson and Kefauver that the labor vote in many districts had been for the Eisenhower-Nixon combination. She concluded by saying that "this was not a contest between parties in Oregon, but a contest between Republican volunteers and paid campaign workers from the East."

Second speaker was Mrs. Billy Blackstone who talked on "Why." Mrs. Blackstone said the Republicans in Oregon had waged an active campaign, but that in many ways it was a negative rather than a positive campaign.

Speaking of the McKay-Morse campaign, Mrs. Blackstone said that the initial lack of enthusiasm for McKay in his own party probably stemmed from the fact that his candidacy was announced from Washington rather than in Oregon and added that "not even Wendell Wyatt (state Republican chairman) was informed in advance that McKay would run for the senate from Oregon."

She added that party leaders in Oregon had waged a "defeat Morse" campaign rather than an "elect McKay" campaign. She said the positive campaign waged by Mark Hatfield and Sig Unander had resulted in their elections.

Mrs. Blackstone spoke of the effect of increasing industrialization in Oregon, of the "labor shift" to the west coast and said that paid workers were brought in to indoctrinate the labor vote. She spoke of the effect the Republican sound money policy had had on depressing the lumber market and of the agriculture vote in eastern Oregon, adding that possibly Secretary of Agriculture Benson should have been brought to Oregon during the campaign.

Mrs. Blackstone also spoke of the effect the public versus partnership power issue had had on the election results, and said the surtax issue had helped to defeat Governor Smith for reelection.

Mrs. Carl Wimberly Jr., was speaker on the "What To Do" topic. She quoted from a post-election speech by Mark Hatfield, secretary of state-elect, who said the party must "seek out young, intelligent candidates for party and public responsibilities who are in step with the thinking of their fellow citizens." She must look forward to rebuilding the Republican party rather than "stewing over mistakes of the past" and that the party in Oregon must "provide constructive cooperation whenever possible, constructive opposition wherever necessary while avoiding embitterment."

She also quoted from the last issue of Business Week in which it was said "Eisenhower is more popular than the Republican party."

The article also said "as many as possible of Eisenhower's attributes must become attributes of the Republican party" and pointed out that the president's first post-election statement signified that he will devote himself to "modernizing" the party. It added that the president's political identity is with the liberal wing of his party and that the influence of leaders" will be designed to remake the Republican party more in Eisenhower's image."

Many members added ideas not only about the results of the election, but concerning voting procedures. It was said that many citizens still do not know how to mark their ballots, and are confused by the voting procedures. Suggestions included a different arrangement of the ballot, printing instructions in red, and mailing of sample ballots to all voters with their voters' pamphlet.

Mrs. Lester Adams summarized the meeting, saying that the women of the party had "labored hard but brought forth an imperfect political infant" and she said that the problem now is to examine the political child, determine its defects and correct them before the election in 1958.

A nominating committee presented a slate of officers for 1957. Nominated were Mrs. Wayne Sline, president; Mrs. C. B. Francis, first vice president; Mrs. Lester Adams, second vice president; Mrs. Howard Arant, third vice president; Mrs. W. W. Deakins, secretary; and Mrs. Frank E. Ross, treasurer. Mrs. Robert J. Keeney is the retiring president.

Mrs. William McAllister, longtime member of the group and

past president, was introduced and presented an orchid.

The McAllisters have left Medford to make their home in Salem since Justice McAllister's appointment and election to the Oregon supreme court.

In making the presentation Mrs. Stephen G. Nye mentioned the "heavy vote of confidence" which had been given to Justice McAllister in the recent election and asked Mrs. McAllister to convey the group's congratulations to her husband.

Mrs. Stine presided.

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1,277 Cattle Sold At Feeder Sale Here
