Gladiola Growers Take Dry Land Farming Advice
Durant, Okla., (U.P.)—When E. D. Carrolls decided to go into the business of raising gladiolas, they took a tip from dry land farmers.

It takes a heap of water to make a gladiola bulb bloom, so the Carrolls installed an irrigation system. During cutting season the flowers must be irrigated once a week. The irrigation system is a battery of four connected sand point wells that deliver 170 gallons of water per minute. A two-inch perforated pipe is used as a sprinkler system.
