Delay in Freight Rate Hearings Asked

Washington (U.P.)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson asked the Interstate Commerce Commission today to postpone for at least two weeks hearings on freight rate increases proposed by Eastern, Western, and Southeastern railroads.

Benson said the department, which opposes the increases, needs more time to prepare evidence.

The ICC set a hearing for Nov. 26 on a request for a 7 percent rate boost to meet increased costs. It set Dec. 14 as the date for filing statements and exhibits in connection with a petition for a 15 percent rate increase to provide a higher return on investment.

Benson asked postponement of both dates to enable the department to represent properly the interests of farmers and the agricultural community in general in opposition to the proposed increases.

Signs of Wrangling Among Russians Told

Washington (U.P.)—Diplomats today reported signs of intensified wrangling among Soviet leaders and among Iron Curtain officials generally over Russia's satellite policies.

The dispute centers on this question: Should Russia relax its grip on the satellites, as it has in Poland, or rule with an iron fist as it is doing in Hungary and others? The conflict promises to grow.

The State Department was watching particularly for the outcome of current talks in Moscow between Kremlin leaders and a delegation from Poland led by Communist party boss Wladyslaw Gomulka. These talks should provide the first hard evidence of whether Russia is willing to go farther toward granting its satellites more independence.
