

Russian Attacks in Hungary Triggered U.S. Campaign To Give Brutal Facts To the World

Washington — (AP)—"Russia Attacks Hungarian Freedom Fighters."

Headlines like this triggered a swift American campaign to tell the world—especially the Soviet Union—the full story of Soviet aggression that drowned the Hungarian revolt in blood.

Special emphasis was placed on getting the story to fence-sitting neutrals which have been unwilling to class the Russians as villains.

All Forces Marshalled

The drive was handled by the U.S. Information Agency which stamped "top priority" on the project and quickly marshalled all its forces to handle it. One top official explained:

"This was a clear case of So-

viet aggression. And we wanted the world to see it and understand it."

The USIA used a variety of propaganda weapons — Voice of American radio broadcasts; international wire service, the agency's private wireless network, and its picture service.

The Voice, the principal arm of the campaign, is the only one that could penetrate the Iron Curtain. It boosted from 28 to 67 the number of programs beamed "live" to satellite audiences.

The broadcasts were in Russian, Lithuanian, Estonian, Georgian, Armenian, Ukrainian, Hungarian, Czech, Slovak, Romanian and Albanian.

Straight News

Usual features like music and special events were trimmed to the minimum so the Voice could concentrate on straight news of the Hungarian crisis.

The Voice denounced the Soviet brutality, but made no effort to incite Hungarians to rebellion. Its moderately worded broadcasts were intended to keep alive the breath of freedom for eventual liberation.

A typical broadcast said: "The cruelty of Soviet behavior in Hungary so far has horrified mankind."

"World opinion, speaking through the United Nations, demand that the Soviet leaders reconsider their present course and respond affirmatively to President Eisenhower's urgent appeal that they remove all Soviet troops from Hungary and allow that nation to choose its own government."

Wide Distribution

While the radio was pouring out the story, the wireless press service was sending thousands of words daily to its approximately 200 posts abroad. The information was then distributed to local newspapers.

The USIA also managed to get pictures of the rebellion from Hungarian refugees who fled to freedom. These photographs, showing Hungarians, battling against Soviet tanks, also were made available to newspapers around the world for use as they saw fit.

Officials said the pictures

were particularly valuable in neutral areas because they showed beyond any doubt how brutal the Russians can be in keeping its satellites in line.

The agency during the uprising also sent its overseas posts a 100,000-word survey entitled "Communist Colonialism and

International Communism." The survey documented how the Soviet Union took over each of its satellite states.

American information officers abroad use such material whenever possible to refute Soviet claims that the satellites really are independent.

Warden Warns Inmates

Chicago — (AP)— Warden Jack Johnson put a censor's foot down on a literary page in the Cook county (Chicago) jail publication, "The Grapevine."

Johnson wasn't amused by the thought that the inmates might be guilty of plagiarism for signing their own names to the words of such authors as Byron, Shakespeare and Whit-

tier. "It's just as bad to lift an author's story, even if he's dead," Johnson said, "as it is to steal his watch."

Clare Boothe Luce Plans To Talk With President

Washington — (AP)— U.S. Ambassador to Italy Clare Boothe Luce, reported to be preparing to resign, planned to confer with President Eisenhower today or Monday.

Mrs. Luce arrived Thursday for consultations with the State Department. She declined to discuss her future plans until a meeting with the President.

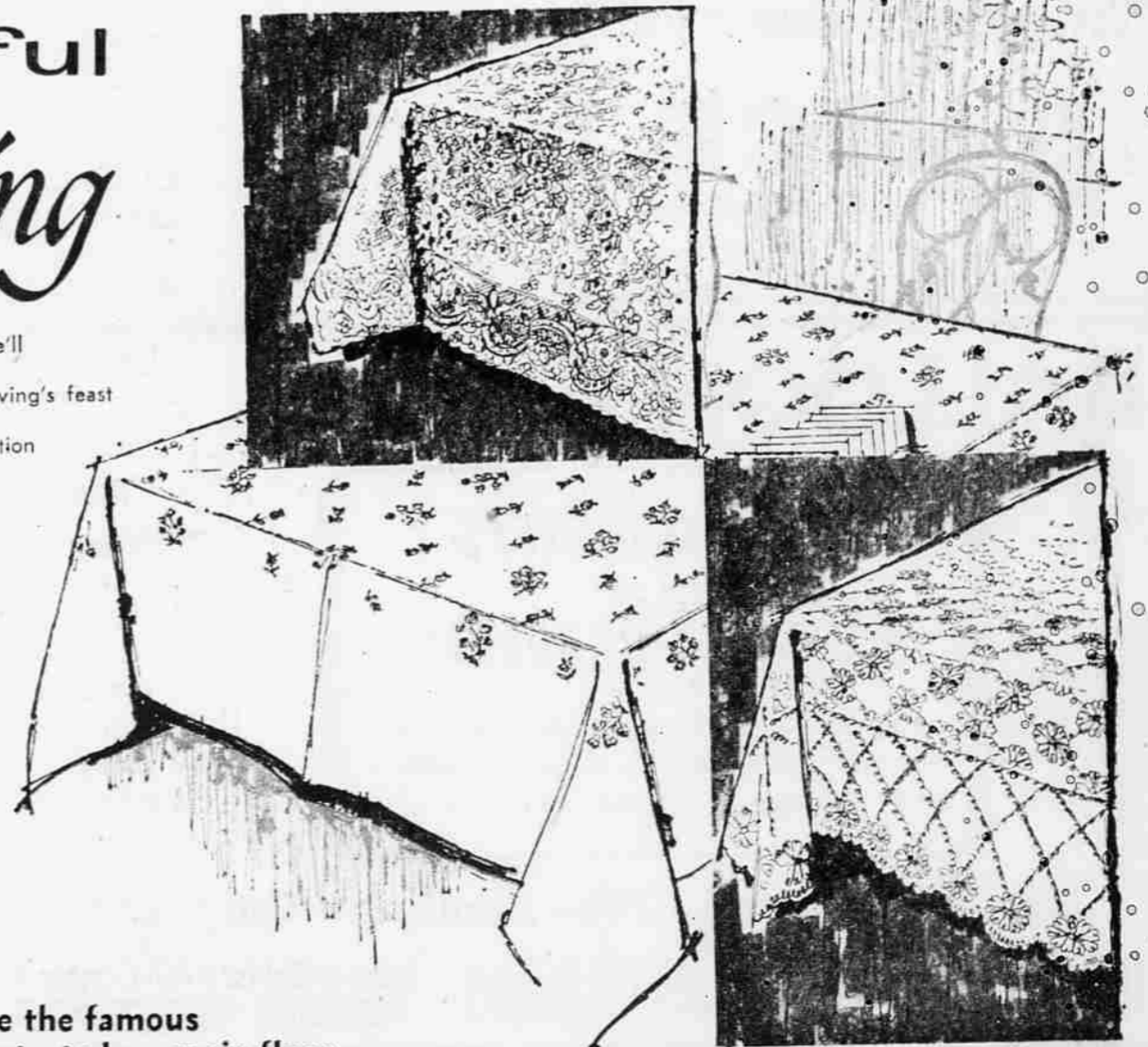
