# Record Attendance In Bible History Classes This Fall

Enrollment in the Bible history classes in Medford and several county schools has increased to nearly 2,000 children this fall. These classes are held in the elementary schools and sponsored by the Jackson County Board of Christian Education.

The children are enrolled in 43 classes in 10 schools and are taught by Miss Verna Cingede and Mrs. Gladys Todd who are hired by the Christian Education board.

The Bible history classes have been taught locally for 11 years. Schools included in the program are the five elementary schools in Medford, the two newly annexed schools of Oakgrove and Westside, and the county schools of Jacksonville, Central Point, and Howard.

The program is on a volunteer basis with letters being sent to the parents at the beginning of each school year. It is financed by part of the local churches.

# Methodist Church Tells Of Missionary Openings

The Board of Missions of the Methodist church has announced openings for 602 career missionaries for its home and overseas fields during 1957.

In announcing its needs for the coming year, the Board, through its Office of Missionary Personnel in New York, said that a step-up in the number of personnel needed for lifetime service has been brought about largely because of the evangelistic emphasis planned in the next four years. The emphasis, termed "A Call to Witness and Decision," aims at increased evangelism in all overseas fields.

The Division of World Missions has openings for 252 single men or couples and has set as a minimum goal for the year 68 couples. That is an increase of about 50 per cent over the minimum goal of 90 persons sought annually in the last few years.

The Woman's Division of Christian Service is seeking 250 single women for service in its overseas fields and 100 men and women for service in home field. The women in home fields are deaconesses and the men are missionaries.

Persons are needed in educational work, church and social work, medical work, agriculture, building, engineering, business, commerce, secretarial work and accounting fields.

Those who go to foreign fields will serve in most of the 40 countries of Europe, Asia, Africa and North and South America where the Methodist church is at work. Those in home fields will serve in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

The qualifications for both home and overseas services are basically the same. A person

The Rev. Mr. Robinson, who has been pastoring the church in Mr. Neely's absence spends a portion of the church year in evangelistic efforts throughout the United States. He will preach for 12 days in the High Park Baptist church in Toronto and then travel to Columbus, Ohio for an 8 day campaign in the Calvary Bible church.

# Coast to Coast Services Launch Sharing Program

New York, N.Y.—A National Capital service of Thanksgiving in Washington, D. C., with simultaneous regions observances—a Midwest Harvest festival in Marshalltown, Iowa, and a West Coast Thanksgiving service in San Francisco—all held on the afternoon of Sunday, Nov. 18, will launch the 1956-57 Share Our Surplus appeal of major Protestant and Eastern Orthodox denominations.

Through the SOS program, foods from our national stocks of surplus are distributed free to needy peoples abroad.

The services in Washington, D.C., Marshalltown and San Francisco will "spotlight" a nationwide chain of similar observances during Thanksgiving week in thousands of communities throughout America, in which millions of Protestant Americans of all denominations will join in gratitude for peace and plenty and for the privilege of sharing their abundance with their neighbors in need across the seas.

In the food distribution program carried on for its 35 constituent denominations by Church World Service, upwards of 700,000,000 pounds of U.S. Government surpluses are expected to have been distributed free to hungry people in Asia, Europe, the Middle East and Latin America before the close of 1957.

The National Capital service in Washington, D.C. will be at The National Presbyterian church, locally sponsored by the Washington Federation of Churches, Dr. Liston Pope, dean of Yale Divinity school, will give the main address.

Main speaker at the Harvest festival at Marshalltown, sponsored by the Iowa State Council of Churches and the Christian Rural Overseas Program of Church World Service, will be Dr. O. Walter Wagner, general secretary of the Metropolitan Church Federation of St. Louis. The service will be held at the First Methodist church of Marshalltown.

At San Francisco, the West observance—at Grace Cathedral—will be addressed by Dr. Lyn White Jr., president of Mills College.
