Redskins Seek To Continue Pro Football Upset Pace

The Washington Redskins will whip the New York Giants Sunday and turn the National Football league's Eastern division into a three-team race if they keep up the pattern they have established in recent weeks.

The Giants (6-1) are seven-point favorites to maintain their one-game Eastern Division lead. But the Redskins (3-3) also were underdogs in their last three starts when they defeated the Cleveland Browns and handed the Chicago Cardinals and Detroit Lions their first 1956 defeats.

The Cardinals (5-2) fell a game behind New York when they

lost to the Giants last Sunday but are six-point choices to get back on the victory path at the expense of the Steelers (2-5) at Pittsburgh.

Detroit and Chicago Bears, tied for the Western lead with 6-1 records, are favored to win before home crowds. The Lions are seven-point favorites to down the Baltimore Colts (3-3) and the Bears are 13-point picks to defeat the Los Angeles Rams (2-5).

In Sunday's other contests, the Eagles (7-4) are five-point favorites to defeat the Browns (2-5) at Philadelphia and the Packers (2-5) are favored over the San Francisco Forty-Niners (2-5) at Green Bay.

WSC Dump Bears Into PCC Cellar

Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Aerial minded Washington State keyed by the passing arm of Sophomore Bob Newman, upset California 14-13 Saturday before 34,000 fans and dumped the hapless Bears into the Pacific Coast conference cellar.

California saw its chance for at least a tie fizzle in the last three minutes of play as a nervous quarterback fumbled a high pass from center on Cal's second conversion attempt, putting Cal just behind Washington State in the cellar.

In a game with the elements of a grudge battle, the Washington State Cougars handed Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf's Bears their seventh defeat of the season — tying the single season loss record for a Waldorf coached team.

It was a grudge battle in the sense that Coach Jim Sutherland, fired by Waldorf two seasons ago in a dispute centering on the fabled Ronny Knox, whom Sutherland originally recruited for California, came to Berkeley wanting nothing more than a victory over the Bears.

UW Outplays Stanford

Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — Washington's Huskies, a team which had been laughed at all season for its fumbling, jammed two of them down Stanford's throat Saturday and completely outplayed the Indians to score a 34-13 upset victory before a stunned crowd of 21,000.

The triumph snapped a four game losing streak and plummeted the once-proud Indians, who had been favored to breeze into the Rose Bowl, to their third straight defeat. It was the worst defeat of the season to be hung on the Indians, who suddenly turned butterfingers and were easily shoved around by an erratic team which was supposed to lose by at least nine points.

It wasn't a fluke in any sense of the word. Three of Washington's tallies came on sustained drives of 66, 84 and 49 yards while two others were the result of Indian bobbles.

Sooners Win 38th Straight

Norman, Okla. — (U.P.) — Top-ranked Oklahoma beat Missouri, 67-14 Saturday to win its 38th consecutive victory and ninth straight Big Seven conference championship.

Missouri's debacle ruined the Orange Bowl hopes for Don Fauriol's squad and assured Colorado of a bid to the Miami extravaganza Jan. 1. Oklahoma cannot repeat in the Orange bowl.

Coach Bud Wilkinson's Sooners, rolling at more than a point a minute, didn't allow Missouri to score until the final quarter when Wilkinson sent his third and fourth units into the game.

HARTACK BOOSTS TOTAL

Baltimore, Md. — (U.P.) — Willie Hartack, seeking his second straight national riding championship, booted home three winners at Pimlico Friday to boost his 1956 victory total to 335-22 more than vacationing Willie Shoemaker.

BARR SCORES THREE
Ann Arbor, Mich. — (U.P.) — Terry Barr scored three touchdowns and Ed Shannon twice Saturday to lead Michigan to an easy 49-26 victory over Indiana in a Big Ten battle before 58,515 chilled fans.

PENN VICTOR
Philadelphia — (U.P.) — Pennsylvania, with haliback Frank Ripel joining the century club with 119 yards gained, strengthened their third place position in the Ivy league Saturday with a 20-6 victory over Columbia that dampened Lou Little's final appearance in a football role on Franklin Field.

BOSTON COLLEGE WINS
Boston — (U.P.) — Boston College partied a trio of talented backs and a vicious charging line into a 13-0 victory over Boston University Saturday in 40 degree weather at Fenway.

ILLINI TIED
Champaign, Ill. — (U.P.) — Illinois and Wisconsin battled to a 13-13 tie Saturday in a Big Ten football game before 52,858 fans in Memorial stadium.

Baltimore, Md. — (U.P.) — Chet Burchett scored three touchdowns Saturday and Navy swamped Virginia, 34-7, in a final tuneup for its annual battle with Army at Philadelphia two weeks hence.

BYU came within inches of crumbling the Pokes dream of a Bowl invitation and an undefeated campaign as tackle Dick Ralph barely missed a 20-yard field goal try late in the fourth period.

Hurricanes Blast Bowl Contender

Miami — (U.P.) — The Orange Bowl committee was shocked by the easy manner in which the Miami Hurricanes had beaten the stuffing out of one of the top contenders for its New Year's football classic.

Led by quarterback Sam Scarnecchia, Miami poured on the power in the second half Friday night to humiliate Clemson, 21-0, before the Orange bowl committee, 47,603 fans and vacationing Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Miami apparently was hopping mad because the NCAA refused this week to lift the school's bowl-denying probation before Jan. 10. They took it out on the team that appears to be a shoe-in for the Atlantic Coast conference title and a trip to the Orange bowl on New Year's day.

Syracuse, N.Y. — (U.P.) — Half-back Jim Brown scored 43 points to lead Syracuse to a 61-7 win over Colgate Saturday before 39,701 at Archbold stadium.

IRISH TRIUMPH
South Bend, Ind. — (U.P.) — Paul Hornung plunged for a touchdown with a minute and 16 seconds to play Saturday to give Notre Dame a 21-14 victory over North Carolina and break an Irish losing streak of five games.

VIRGINIA SWAMPS
Baltimore, Md. — (U.P.) — Chet Burchett scored three touchdowns today and Navy swamped Virginia 34-7 in a final tuneup for its annual battle with Army at Philadelphia two weeks hence.

Records Broken In Yank Tune-Up

Bendigo, Australia — (U.P.) — Jack Davis of Glendale, Calif., broke the world's record of the 120-high hurdles and Arnie Sowell of Pittsburgh shattered John Landy's Australian mark for the half mile Saturday in a pre-Olympic track and field meet.

Davis was clocked in 13.3 seconds on his specialty, cutting two-tenths of a second off Dick Attlesey's world record set in 1950.

Sowell was timed in 1:49.3 in winning the first heat of the 880-yard event. Landy's Australian mark stood at 1:50.4.

Leamon King of Delano, Calif., led a U.S. sweep of all three heats in the 100-yard dash and then equaled the world record of 9.3 seconds in winning the final Ira Murchison of Chicago finished second.

Murchison and Campbell each were timed in 9.7 second in winning their preliminary heats.

This was the final major tune-up for the Olympics.

Colorado Trips Utah

Salt Lake City — (U.P.) — Orange Bowl bound Colorado, stunned by a quick Utah touchdown, had too much power and depth for the Utes as the Buffs came back to grind out a 21-7 victory before 9,798 fans in rain soaked Ute Stadium Saturday.

The Buffs, taking no chances on losing the post season bowl bid against upset minded Utah, struck close to the ground as the bigger Colorado line opened gaping holes, allowing their backs to pick up considerable yardage.

Utah threatened on several occasions to keep the game interesting, but the Utes were never able to penetrate the Colorado goal after scoring their only touchdown in the first few minutes.

It was Colorado's seventh straight win over the Skyline team. Colorado hasn't lost to the Utes since Jack Curtis took over the Utah job in 1949.

Harold Carter Subdues Johnson

New York — (U.P.) — Heavyweight contender Harold Carter plans to fight again at Madison Square garden on Dec. 21 despite the brow-cut suffered Friday night while winning a stiff television bout with substitute Young Jack Johnson, who required oxygen at the finish.

Dr. Vincent Nardiello said the seven-stitch gash in Carter's right brow should be healed in time for the sixth-ranked contender of Linden, N.J., to meet fifth-ranked Bob Baker of Pittsburgh in their postponed, bout Dec. 21.

Tall, unranked Johnson of Los Angeles substituted Friday night for Baker, who withdrew Monday because of the gripe. Because he accepted the fight on short notice, Johnson wasn't "sharp." He was so dizzy and exhausted in the dressing room that Nardiello administered oxygen for nearly 10 minutes.

However, Johnson was not sent to a hospital, and Nardiello said "He'll be all right."

Sugar Ray Goes 3 in Preparation

Greenwood Lake, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Sugar Ray Robinson boxed four rounds Saturday, two each with Lee Williams of Augusta, Ga., and Abdu Ali of Brooklyn, in preparation for his middleweight title fight with Gene Fulmer at Madison Square Garden, Dec. 12.

It was the first sparring Robinson had done since he out-pointed Bob Provisi at New Haven, Conn., last Saturday night.

JUST JOKE
Melbourne — (U.P.) — That world record-equalling leap by high jumper Maurice Fournier was "just a joke," the young Frenchman admitted. Fournier announced Thursday he had leaped seven feet, 1-3 inch during practice for the Olympics but one of his teammates, Michel Macquet, today confessed they thought up the story to "get some publicity."

Jack Davis Certain Of Gold Medal

Bendigo, Australia — (U.P.) — Jack Davis, a heart-breaking loser in the 1952 Olympics, established himself an almost-certain Gold Medal winner in this year's games when he bettered the world record for the 120-yard high hurdles with a 13.3 second clocking.

However, neither Davis' feat nor a world record-tying 9.3 seconds for the 100-yard sprint by Leamon King of Delano, Calif., are likely to be recognized officially as world records. Davis ran on grass and King was aided by a wind, two factors that made record recognition improbable.

Minor League Opposition
United States track and field stars, running largely against "minor league" opposition, won nine of the 16 events in this final tuneup for the Olympic Games which begin next Thursday. Russia entered no athletes in the 13-oation meet.

Davis surpassed the Dick world record of 13.5 set by Dick Attlesey of the United States in 1950 and also bettered the 13.4 clocking he made earlier this year in the 100-meter high hurdles—10 inches farther than the 120-yard event.

Meet officials said they would submit Davis' clocking for international recognition. However, the International Amateur Athletic Federation has been re-
