Melbourne, Australia—(U.P.)—A scheduled slowdown strike of transportation workers will be delayed at least until after the Olympic games open Thursday, a union official said Saturday.
Victoria's Trades Hall council, ruling body for union groups here, has approved slowdown strikes in key unions during the next few weeks.
"But we have no intention of staging stop-works or slowdowns on opening day," Trades Hall Council Secretary Jack Stout said today. "Unionists consider it a public holiday and the opening games should not be disturbed."

Dry Cloth May Mar Auto Windshield

Pittsburgh—(U.P.)—Wiping your automobile windshield with a dry cloth might mar instead of clean it, according to a glass expert.
Russell C. Whittemore, product development director of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Co., said that grit particles, which are harder than glass, may scratch glass if it is wiped with a dry cloth. Instead, he suggests keeping windshields clean by washing with a soft cloth or a sponge and lots of water.
He also suggested that motorists should avoid running windshield wipers on dry glass cleaning glass with abrasive compounds, or using oily or greasy rags or cleaning preparations containing oil or grease.
Whittemore advised against following other cars too closely because the tires of the car ahead will hurl small stones, sand and gravel with enough force to cause pock marks, con-

Red Cross Convoy Forced to Leave

Bonn, Germany—(U.P.)—The West German Red Cross said Saturday its 18-car convoy was forced to leave Hungary because Soviet and Hungarian officials refused to extend visas for its 50 volunteer workers.
Soviet-Hungarian authorities strongly objected to the fact the group maintained a radio transmitter with shortwave contacts to Germany, Red Cross officials said.

Free Elections Said 'Beneath Contempt'

London—(U.P.)—Radio Moscow charged Saturday Western calls for internationally supervised free elections in Hungary are "beneath contempt" and said they will be rejected by the Budapest regime.
The Moscow commentator said this matter and the proposal to send United Nations observers into Hungary are a smoke screen to hide Anglo-French intervention in Egypt.

Texans Follow 'Eat Beef' Slogan

Dallas, Tex.—(U.P.)—The Texas Beef Council, which insists that Texans should "eat beef every day," reports an all-time high for summer beef eating in the Lone Star state.
Leo J. Welder, council president from Victoria, Tex., said a survey of food chains totaling more than 750 retail stores over the state, showed Texans ate 16 per cent more beef this past summer than in 1953.

That amounts to 13.67 pounds of beef per Texan, Welder said. Most of the increase was in such cuts as short ribs, brisket and pot roasts, which the council has been emphasizing.
Many stores reported increased demand for cuts of meat that could be adapted for outdoor cooking.

Welder said the council had stressed recipes and given demonstrations promoting outdoor cooking during the summer. The result, he said, was that outdoor broiling and barbecuing reached an all-time peak.

Sunday Pleasure Driving Banned in Switzerland

Bern, Switzerland—(U.P.)—The Swiss government banned Sunday pleasure driving Saturday to cut down gas consumption.
The government ordered citizens to stay at home or walk on Sundays to help preserve fuel supplies threatened by the blocking of the Suez Canal by sunken ships.
