**Christmas Seals TV Topic Sunday**

"How your Christmas seal money affects you and tuberculosis in your community" will be the subject of a program on KBES-TV on Sunday, November 18, at 4:30 p.m.

This program will be the first of a series of two explaining how Christmas seal money is used to protect residents of the community from the ravages of this disease. The second program will show how Christmas seal money comes to the rescue when an individual contacts the disease, despite all the precautions of preventive measures.

On the first program, Mrs. M. O. Grove, the Christmas seal sale chairman of Jackson County, will follow the introduction of the seal sale twins. She will give a short talk on the traditions of the Christmas seal sale and how it has become part of the Christmas celebration. Seth Bullis will then explain the intricate financing of the multiple projects financed by the returns, through the Jackson County Public Health association.

Colonel William Bartlett, chairman of the case finding committee of the public health association, will explain how tuberculosis is attacked on many fronts, in order to prevent its spread. Dr. A. Erin Merkel will follow him with comments on the public health department aspects of tuberculosis.

The family doctor and his relationship to this community project will be illustrated by Dr. Lawrence Buonocone and a former tuberculosis patient.

This program will introduce the Christmas seal sale season, as the seals will be mailed to all homes in Jackson County on November 15th.
