Oregon Veneer Low Bidder on Timber

Oregon Veneer company, Medford, submitted the low bid for an estimated 3,116,000 board feet of timber offered by the Medford office bureau of land management, Nov. 15. The timber is in the Trail creek area. It was purchased for \$103,250.80 in an oral auction in which two other bidders participated. Oregon Veneer's bid for Douglas fir, which accounted for over 75 per cent of the volume, was \$32.20 per thousand board feet. Prices for other species were \$51.50 for sugar pine, \$44 for ponderosa pine, \$19 for white fir, and \$11 for incense cedar. After completion of logging operations, the purchaser will be required to seed about 150 acres of the area with ponderosa pine seed in order to assure adequate reforestation. The Medford office of BLM will offer four tracts of timber containing about 11,000,000 board feet for sale Dec. 13. Two tracts are in the Glendale area. One is on Thompson creek in southeastern Josephine county and one is in the Jenny creek area of eastern Jackson county. Additional information regarding the proposed sales is available at the district forest office in the Medford city hall.

170-Acre Tract Bought For Demonstration Plot
