Campaign Spending Revealed in Reports

Salem—U.P.—Statements filed with Secretary of State Earl T. Newby Friday indicated that various Oregon labor organizations spent \$37,718 in support of various candidates and political committees in the recent general election campaign.

The State Labor Council expended \$45,721 of which \$20,800 went to Democratic candidates and \$24,921 to candidates and committees. Committees for two Republicans received support. They were State Treasurer Sig Unander and State Sen. Carl Francis who ran against Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

The Robert Morse Committee reported expenditures of \$89,437.

Congressman Walter Norblad filed a statement showing personal expenditures of \$1,050. His committee spent an additional \$2,222.

Harris Ellsworth reported expenditures of \$1,640 in his fourth district congressional race.

Other expenditures included William McAllister for Supreme Court committee, \$1,277; Wiley W. Smith, Portland, state treasurer, \$153; and Wiley W. Smith committee, \$854.
