New Map of Medford, County Near Ready

A new map of Medford and Jackson county will soon be available at local drug stores, according to Don P. McNeil, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

The maps will be available in bulk amounts to business outlets at 15 cents per copy and for resale at the printed price of 25 cents. They will be in two colors. They will also have statistical information and contain a detailed Medford and vicinity map on one side and Jackson county on the reverse side.

The map has been brought up to date and will show the latest streets and roads.

Christmas Seals Are Being Mailed

Christmas seals are being mailed to homes in Jackson County this week, according to Mrs. M. O. Grove, Jackson County chairman of the seal sale for 1956.

Because this year is the 50th anniversary of the first seal sale, efforts are being made to maintain the traditional form of providing for the more unfortunate at Christmas, she said.

Mrs. Grove pointed out that, because of rising costs, including medical care, the tuberculosis prevention program is more important than previously, and she expressed hope that efforts will be made to contribute as much as possible for the program.

The seal sale, which is the sole financial support of the Jackson County Health association, sponsors several tuberculosis prevention programs, including the public health education program. Each case of tuberculosis costs the community approximately \$15,000, Mrs. Grove noted, and prevention of one case of tuberculosis saves the county in one year more than one-third again as much as is collected through the yearly seal sale.

The association considered plans for aiding and bringing together the flood control, irriga-

tion, power, recreational and sportsmen interests in the Rogue valley so that a satisfactory plan for all the interests can be formulated for the development of the full resources of the valley, Sexton said.
