Place for Horses on Farms to Continue

West Valley, N.Y. — U.P. — Henry Feldman, West Valley dairyman and horsebreeder, is one man who refuses to believe "Old Dobbin" or the "Old Gray Mare" is a thing of the past on farms.

He maintains there will always be horses on farms—some farms, that is, Feldman bases his certainty on the fact that the rising prices of farm tractors and gasoline to run them are causing many farmers to turn back to horses.

The 30-year-veteran of the horse-raising business said horses are less hazardous and more economical when employed on certain types of hilly farms.

He reports that a good team of work horses will cost probably between \$500 and \$800, while the average tractor is priced at \$2,500.

Confident that horses are here to stay, Feldman is stepping up his draft horse breeding program. His stables now include 11 purebred Belgian horses and five colts.

Only Three Months Free of Pedestrian Accidents in City

There have been only three months so far this year without traffic accidents involving pedestrians in the city of Medford. Police Chief Charles Champlin said today.

Champlin made the report in emphasis of national pedestrian safety month being observed during November. The pedestrian accident-free months were June, July and October.

The police chief also noted that Medford's only pedestrian traffic fatality of 1956 occurred Nov. 2, at the onset of national pedestrian safety month.

From January through October, 14 pedestrian traffic accidents were reported to Medford police. Most of the accidents occurred while pedestrians were crossing streets and in three instances pedestrians were crossing in mid-block. The November fatality also occurred while the pedestrian was crossing the street in mid-block.

Champlin urged pedestrians to carefully observe safety practices and not rely on the driver's ability to stop. They should be especially cautious in crossing streets during the winter, he pointed out, since wet or icy streets often make it impossible for drivers to stop suddenly. Champlin reminded pedestrians to wear light colored clothing at night or carry lights so drivers will be able to see them.

Law Quoted

He also noted Oregon traffic laws state, "In crossing streets, a pedestrian shall not leave the curb or other place of safety suddenly and moved into the path of a vehicle which is so close it is impossible for the driver to yield." The law also requires pedestrians crossing roadways at any other places than within marked or unmarked crosswalks to yield the right of way to vehicles.

Cafeteria Operator Finds Honest People

Dallas, Tex. — U.P. — B. B. Crump has found honest men by the thousands and didn't go out with a lantern as Diogenes did.

Crump uses coffee, coffee cake, blueberry muffins, doughnuts, and rolls to prove his point. Crump operates a cafeteria that serves 300 to 400 persons every morning. There's no cashier. The customers deposit their own money and fish out their own change.

Crump said he has found in two and one-half years of operation that the few cases of his being short-changed that turn up are mistakes.
