Zellerbach Choice Declared Imminent

Washington—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower's formal designation of James B. Zellerbach of San Francisco to succeed Mrs. Clare Booth Luce as ambassador to Italy is reported imminent. Informed sources said Wednesday night the White House announcement may come before the end of the week. Mrs. Luce resigned the Rome post Monday after 3 1/2 years of diplomatic service because of her health. So far the White House officially has declined to comment on her successor. Zellerbach has figured prominently in recent speculation. Dispatches from Rome have said, moreover, that the Italian government has given its formal approval to Zellerbach's appointment to the post, one of the most important in the current world crisis.

Lumber Dip Blamed On Inventory Cuts

Portland—(U.P.)—Desire by dealers to reduce year end inventories was blamed today for dropping demand for lumber and plywood to a new-record low as the year's end approached. Market surveys today gave little indication of an immediate improvement in the situation, particularly in the light of forecasts of continued tight money policies and additional cuts in new housing starts. Crow's Lumber Digest said yesterday that its latest index showed a decline of about 25 cents on 75 items in the Douglas fir and western pine area production. Sawlog prices also reflected the low demand for lumber.

Eisenhowers Spend Thanksgiving Day With Son and Family

Washington—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower passed up gold forks, crystal goblets and a 40-pound turkey at the White House today to spend Thanksgiving in the relatively modest Ft. Belvoir Army quarters of his son, Maj. John S. Eisenhower.

Instead of a Thanksgiving dinner prepared by White House chefs and served by a retinue of stiff-shirted waiters, the President and his wife chose to share a holiday feast cooked personally by John's wife, Barbara. Important as he is, Mr. Eisenhower was not the star of the occasion. That role fell to his four grandchildren.

The President and the First Lady started the holiday by attending special Thanksgiving services at the National Presbyterian church. Then, accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Mrs. John S. Doud of Denver, they drove to the nearby Virginia Army post where John Eisenhower is stationed.

Dinner in the Army post quarters of the John Eisenhowers was strictly a family affair. It taxed Barbara's talent as a mother and a housewife to crowd her Thanksgiving spread for the grownups and the children into her dining room.

One-Day Holiday
The John Eisenhowers live in a comfortable, red brick colonial style home on the Fort Belvoir reservation, a house like hundreds of others occupied by Army families in the area.

The four Eisenhower grandchildren are David, 8; Barbara Anne, 7; Susan, 4, and Mary Jean, 11 months. Mr. Eisenhower seldom has an opportunity to visit them in their home and usually sees them only at the White House. Mrs. Eisenhower, however, drives down to Fort Belvoir frequently.

This was to be a one-day holiday for the President. He faces a regular working schedule in his office Friday.

Generals Arrested In Buenos Aires

Buenos Aires, Argentina—(U.P.)—Generals Leon Bengoa and Juan Jose Uranga were arrested today with a group of plotters outside an army barracks at dawn, the government announced.

Both men helped in the overthrow of President Juan Peron. Bengoa became minister of war in the first cabinet of late President Gen. Eduardo Lonardi and Uranga was minister of labor.

After that the two men sided with the Nationalist Catholic movement toward former Peronists and Bengoa was arrested and banished to the provinces. He was released only recently.

President Gen. Pedro E. Aramburu, in a speech two days ago at La Plata, said the government would take "strong measures" against all who plot against the government.

Pendleton Round-Up Directors Elected

Pendleton—(U.P.)—Jack Stangier, Pendleton city councilman, yesterday was elected president of the Board of Directors of the Pendleton Round-Up.

Stangier served as director of the 1956 show and also is a member of the State Racing Commission.

Other officers of the board elected yesterday were: Robert Shay, vice president; Jim Perry, secretary; and Charles Hester, treasurer.

Retiring president is Finis Kirpatrick. A new member to the board will be named to fill the vacancy created by the expiration of his term.

Wayne King Orchestra Player Found Slain

Chicago—(U.P.)—Police sought a man with long hair today for questioning in connection with the mysterious death of Jay Grace, violinist with Wayne King's orchestra.

The nude body of Grace, whose head was battered, was found yesterday lying across a bed in the man's hotel room by a chambermaid, Mrs. Adeline Dixon.

Authorities were unable to say definitely whether death was caused by a blunt instrument or a bullet.

Temperatures Hit Lowest Readings As Cold Blows In

The nation shivered Thanksgiving day as a cold snap knifed through the eastern two-thirds of the nation, holding temperatures to some of the lowest readings of the year.

Meanwhile, a blanket of white covered a narrow band from the Western Dakotas and Eastern Montana to Northwest Kansas. It also was snowing very lightly, often mostly flurries, from Minnesota southward through Missouri and eastward through the Great Lakes and West Virginia.

Wet on East Coast
It was a wet Thanksgiving all along the East coast southward through Northern Florida. But elsewhere it generally was fair, with a slight warming occurring from New Mexico and Colorado westward to the Pacific Coast.

The cold air began slicing eastward Wednesday night as forecasters issued warnings of a cold wave for the Dakotas, Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska.

Temperatures early today fell to around five degrees above zero in the Dakotas, and generally in the 20s throughout the Great Lakes region.

Winds on Great Lakes
A fresh supply of cold air also spilled southeastward out of Canada through the Northern Great Plains states to strengthen the icy blasts of the cold snap.

Blustery winds accompanied the nippy air front as it penetrated to the Appalachians and the Atlantic Coast, and then the winds diminished. Across the open waters of the Great Lakes, the winds reached velocities of 60 miles per hour, and tossed high waves about the lakes.

Freighter Disabled
An ore freighter was disabled on Lake Superior Wednesday night in the gale and heavy seas when its rudder broke. Coast Guard officials later reported the ship, the J. P. Wells, was proceeding under her own power and was in no danger.

The gale-driven snow swept across roads and highways and piled into deep drifts. Highways were packed with ice and snow throughout the Midwest and Northern Plains. Authorities warned of extremely hazardous driving conditions on the glazed roads.

Grade Average of C Seen Starting Point For College Entrance

Salem—(U.P.)—State educators agreed here yesterday that a high school grade average of C or better for entrance to state-operated colleges would be a good starting point if expanding enrollments force state schools to become selective in their admissions.

The point was emphasized at the meeting, attended by representatives of the State Board of Higher Education, college representatives and high schools, that no definite plan has been finally selected for setting up entrance requirements to colleges and no date set for putting any plan into effect.

Time Might Come
The possibility that a time might come, and in the not too distant future, when a high school diploma will not automatically qualify a person for admission, prompted the meeting.

A proposed plan for screening prospective students was presented by Earl Pallett, secretary of the State Board of Higher Education. In effect, the plan would allow admission to high school students with a grade average of C or better, those below a C average who passed a college entrance test, or those below a C average who could not take the entrance test but acquired a C average in a summer term with a full load of studies.

Entrance Examination
Jim Adamson, representing the High School Principals' Association, suggested further study of the idea that all students be required to pass an entrance examination. He said that dependency on high school grades might place too much burden on the secondary teacher whose marks would determine if a student were admitted to a college.

The FBI said that King is married and has two children, five and three. He lived in Salt Lake City for about eight months.

Television Planned In John Day Valley

John Day—(U.P.)—Steps have been initiated to bring television programs to the John Day valley and residents of John Day, Canyon City, Prairie City and Mount Vernon, spokesmen said here today.

A meeting, attended by about 70 residents, was held this week to discuss the project and lay plans for its development.

Preliminary tests indicate that signals from Boise can be picked up with the necessary strength from Airport Hill overlooking John Day. Initial plans call for receiving two Boise VHF channels and re-transmitting them as UHF signals in the area.
