Four Persons Hit By Cars This Week

Many pedestrians crossing in mid-block don't realize they are not as nimble as they used to be until they are hit by cars, according to Police Chief Charles Champlin.

Emphasizing November pedestrian safety month, Champlin said that even a teenage track star shouldn't try to outrun a car.

The National Safety Council supports the statement and reported that of all accidents in the nation involving pedestrians, the majority are over 45 years of age.

Champlin noted that three of the four jaywalkers struck by cars in Medford this year were over 45. Of all pedestrian traffic accidents here in the past nine months, six were over 45, six were under 45 and the age was not stated for two victims.

Police Plan to Enforce Ordinance

Medford police will enforce the city ordinance pertaining to parking meter violations "much more strictly than it has in the past," Police Chief Charles Champlin has announced.

The chief said cars will be cited for remaining at parking meters beyond the time-limit designated on the meter, whether or not the additional meter charge has been made.

The ordinance pertaining to continuous parking is based on the theory that as many parking spaces as possible should be made available for parking, he said.

Champlin added that the police department has received many complaints recently on motorists leaving cars parked for indefinite time periods beyond the time designation on the meters.

"The stricter enforcement of the parking ordinance is for the benefit of most of the people," he said, "and is intended to alleviate the present parking problem."

The chief urged people using parking meters to be especially cooperative at this particular time because of the coming Christmas season.

American Men, Accomplished Loafers, Turn To Model Building for Pasttime

Chicago — (U.P.) — Consulting psychologist Peter Siegel says American men are the world's most accomplished loafers. Siegel was hired by Monogram Models to find out why more grown men than boys have taken up model building as a hobby.

He concluded that the leisure afforded by the 40-hour week is a major factor, combined with a sort of guilt complex about idleness.

Siegel said this feeling of guilt is a hand-me-down from the puritanical philosophy of our forefathers, who regarded idleness as a sin.

"On the one hand, men welcome the ever-increasing amount of time away from their jobs," Siegel said. "On the other, they are conscience bound to spend at least part of that time in constructive activity."

The psychologist said building model planes, boats and trains is a light, enjoyable pastime, but challenging enough to give a man a feeling of accomplishment.

Nice Hobby He said it's a nice hobby for a man who likes to stick close to home and family, but lacks the talent or inclination to plunge into major do-it-yourself projects or gardening.

"Many men look upon working around the house as a form of drudgery, a sort of 'second job,'" Siegel said. "They feel they have earned the right to take it easy at home."

But they still aren't happy doing nothing, he said. Siegel said model building also is a "rebellion in miniature" against an age of specialization.

Thousands of men feel the need to see a job through, from beginning to end. But their specialized work just doesn't afford them this opportunity, the psychologist said.

"Yesterday's cabinet maker would toil painstakingly over a chest of drawers. When he finished, it bore his personal stamp and was a direct product of his own efforts and ability."

"But nowadays, Siegel said, an employee of a furniture factory could only point to a chest of drawers and say, "I sawed the wood."

"Specialized business methods and mass production manufacturing techniques have robbed many men of one of the principal rewards of working—that of seeing the job through," he said.
