

Jack Morris Stars as Oregon Deadlocks Oregon State 14-14

Corvallis — (UPI) — Underdog Oregon came from behind twice yesterday, the second time with less than two minutes to play, to tie the Rose Bowl bound Beavers of Oregon State 14-14 in the 60th renewal of their traditional football rivalry.

The Webfoots spotted Oregon State a touchdown, then took advantage of a Beaver fumble for a tying score early in the second quarter. Oregon came back in the closing minutes of the game to push across another equalizer. Oregon State had taken a 14-7 lead a few minutes earlier.

The tie was the eighth in the traditional rivalry. Oregon has won 29 games and Oregon State 23.

A sun-drenched crowd of 17,300 Thanksgiving day fans were on hand in Parker stadium and thousands of others watched on television throughout the West.

Oregon Quarterback Tom Crabtree pitched a 17-yard strike to Jack Morris with 1:51 remaining in the game to give Oregon two touchdowns to two for Oregon State. Morris chipped in with his 22nd consecutive extra point to deadlock the game.

Oregon State tried desperately to score again through the air but failed.

The Webfoots, basically a ground team, used the air to set up their initial score of the day. Crabtree shot a 19-yard gainer to Jim Shanley that put Oregon on the Oregon State four. Shanley went over from there on the next play.

Durden Leaves Game
Oregon State scored first early in the second quarter with Fullback Tom Berry plunging over from two yards out. Wingback Earnel Durden, who left the game early in the second half after a kickoff scuffle with Oregon's Spike Hillstrom, sparked the 38-yard touchdown drive with a romp to the Oregon 19. Hillstrom also was asked to leave.

Wingback Sterling Hammack, who fumbled an Oregon punt on the Oregon State 36 to set up the first Oregon touchdown, broke loose on a 23-yard run early in the third period to spark the Beavers' final 69-yard touchdown drive. Hammack shot through the Oregon line from 14 yards out for the score.

The tie left the Pacific Coast's Rose Bowl representative with a season record of seven wins, two losses and one tie. Oregon had a 4-4-2 mark.

Beaver Gridders May Have To Work Miracle in Bowl

Coach Tommy Prothro, who worked a "little miracle" to get Oregon State into the Rose Bowl, will have to work a "big miracle" if he expects the Beavers to beat Iowa in the New Year's Day classic.

The Beavers, who will carry a 7-2-1 record into the Rose Bowl, were held to a 14-14 tie by arch-rival Oregon Thursday in their traditional Turkey Day tussle. Considering their loss to Iowa in a regular-season game, the future doesn't appear very bright for the Beavers.

However, Prothro, now in his second season at Oregon State, has five weeks and four days

to work on his charges, who have averaged only 18.9 points per game while allowing their opponents an average of 13.1 points per contest.

As in most of its games, the tussle with Oregon was close all the way. Only in its games with Washington State and UCLA, which it won by scores of 21-0 and 21-7, respectively, did Oregon State enjoy any breathing room. Against the Webfoots, State twice led by a touchdown, but both times the lead vanished.

South Carolina Victor
While Oregon State's fortunes were dipping, South Carolina's Gamecocks improved their chances for an Orange Bowl bid by defeating Wake Forest, 13-0. It was South Carolina's seventh victory in 10 starts. The game marked the season's finale for the Gamecocks, who now can sit back and see how Duke and Clemson fare in Saturday games. The Blue Devils and the Tigers are the other Atlantic Coast Conference teams with a chance to gain the remaining Orange Bowl berth against Colorado.

In other Thanksgiving Day games, Maryland and Cornell salvaged some glory out of a nightmare season. Miami of Ohio defeated the University of Cincinnati, 27-13. Brown upset Colgate, 20-0. Virginia Tech walloped Virginia Military, 45-0. Richmond squeezed past William and Mary, 6-0, and Utah downed Utah State, 29-7.

Maryland overcame a two-touchdown deficit to defeat North Carolina, 25-14, and gain

only its second win of the year in 10 starts, while Cornell, defeated in all of its eight previous starts, picked on Pennsylvania for a 20-7 victory in their 63rd meeting.

More Bowl Bidding
Here is how the situation stands for other bowl hopefuls: **Sugar Bowl**—Tennessee, which more than likely will represent the Southeastern Conference, plays Kentucky on Saturday. Georgia Tech, Southern Methodist and Baylor are the other hopefuls. Tech meets Florida, and SMU plays Baylor on Saturday.

Cotton Bowl—Texas Christian, leading Southwest Conference candidate, meets Rice, while SMU and Baylor are others with a chance. Guest team possibilities include Tennessee, Georgia Tech and Navy, which doesn't play until Dec. 1 against Army.

Gator Bowl—Officials trying for Tennessee and Georgia Tech, but may have to settle for Syracuse, Mississippi, Pittsburgh or Wyoming. Syracuse has completed its season 7-1; Mississippi plays Mississippi State on Dec. 1; Pittsburgh plays Penn State Saturday, and Wyoming has completed its season 10-0.

Goalie Lorne Gump Worsley, often the target of Coach Phil Watson's sharpest criticism, was due some praise today for his part in ending the New York Rangers' 10-game winless streak.

Worsley turned aside a total of 42 shots, including 11 in a furious last period Thursday night when the Rangers beat the Boston Bruins, 4-3, in Boston. The loss ended the Bruins' unbeaten string at nine games and left them one point ahead of the second-place Detroit Red Wings, who battled to a 2-2 tie with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

The last-place Chicago Black Hawks scored their fourth win in 18 games when they upset the Stanley Cup champion Montreal Canadiens, 5-3 in the other game.

AMERICAN LEAGUE
Johnny Bower, a former New York Ranger, notched his 35th lifetime American Hockey League shut-out Thursday night. That superlative performance put Bower and his Providence team today on the threshold of marks they have been coveting all year long.

The 2-0 whitewash of Rochester placed the Reds only one point out of first place and Bower only one shut-out away from the AHL record of 36.

In other games, Hershey clung to first place by staving off a last ditch Springfield rally and then settling for a tie in overtime.

Improving Cleveland won its fourth straight, 3-1, over Buffalo. No Elk; Fred Glover and John McClellan scored for the winners while Larry Wilson supplied the Buffalo offense.

Oregon State Footballers Disappointed

Corvallis — (UPI) — Oregon State's football players were obviously disappointed yesterday that they had to settle for a 14-14 tie with Oregon in their annual "Civil War" game.

Coach Tommy Prothro said "I feel that we made more mistakes than Oregon did and, quite naturally we were hurt terribly when Durden was ejected from the game."

Wingback Earnel Durden and Oregon Guard Spike Hillstrom were asked to depart from the contest after the second half kickoff. Durden admitted he swung at Hillstrom but only after he was jolted in the ribs with an elbow. "I know I shouldn't have done it. And you can be sure I learned a lesson I'll never forget," he said.

As for the Rose Bowl, Prothro used the phrase "If we get the bid" in any discussion of the Pasadena contest. The Beavers are considered a cinch to get the nod.

Good Representative
Coach Len Casanova of Oregon said Oregon State "will be a good representative in the Rose Bowl."

Quarterback Tom Crabtree said the payoff touchdown pass to Jack Morris which tied the game was called from the bench. "We had the pattern to Morris all year but none of us quarterbacks ever called it before," he said.

Hillstrom was unhappy about leaving the game and denied he slugged Durden. "Never... have I been kicked out of a game or even had an unnecessary roughness penalty called against me," he said. "I simply blocked Durden and then went back into our huddle. The next thing I knew someone said I was out. And out I went."
