

EAGLES OPPOSE SILVERTON IN SATURDAY SEMI-FINAL

Eagle Point—The Eagle Point High school football contingent, which already has achieved the most success of any athletic club in school history, headed north this morning in an effort for even greater honors.

The Eagles were en route for Salem where they'll oppose Silver-ton on Bennett (South Salem high) field on Saturday night in a semi-final play-off in the Oregon A-2 championship eliminations. Kick-off time is 8 p.m.

Winner will advance into next week end's A-2 finale against Central Union or Reedsport. Those clubs play at North Bend also on Saturday.

Hopes of Coach Stan Smith's title ambitious Eagles are based on the offensive running of fleet and shifty Jack Greb, booming Norm Hooper and speedy Jim Duncan and on a defense which has been tough and reluctant yielding throughout the year.

A squad of 24 players and two managers are in the Eagle contingent. They and Coach Smith are accompanied by assistant manager, Art Thompson and school vice-principal, S. W. Callaghan.

Bill Russell Leads Yank Olympic Quint

Melbourne — (U.P.) — All-American Bill Russell, in action only 13 minutes, led the United States to a 98-40 victory today over Japan in its first game in defense of the Olympic basketball title.

For a few minutes early in the game, the U.S. team gave its supporters some anxious moments when it fell behind 13-17 against the undersized Japanese.

But the six-foot-10 Russell's entry into the game turned the tide almost immediately. The brilliant former University of San Francisco star came off the bench with five minutes and 15 seconds remaining in the first half and promptly dropped in two field goals that tied the score at 17-17.

Then Russell and his All-American teammate at San Francisco, K. C. Jones, took charge of the game and led the Americans to a 33-20 halftime advantage. The Yanks never were pressed thereafter.

The Japanese appeared to confuse the highly favored Americans with their fast breaking offense and their unusual agility which gave them brief control of the backboards. Japan led for the first nine and one-half minutes of play.

Russell, an All-America for the past two college seasons and the United Press player of the year for 1955-56, scored six points in the first half and 20 points for the 13 minutes he was in action.

From the moment he entered the game, the Japanese game became all confusion.

In afternoon games, the Philippines defeated Thailand, 94-55; France beat Singapore, 81-54; and Uruguay beat Bulgaria, 70-65. Brazil walloped Chile 78-59, in the opening game of the evening double-header.

The United States next plays Thailand Saturday.

Humboldt State Blasts Whitman

Eureka, Calif. — (U.P.) — Humboldt State crushed Whitman College of Walla Walla, Wash., 54-20 yesterday before a Thanksgiving day crowd of 4,500 here.

Fullback Ralph Mayo and halfback Earl Barnum each scored twice for the winners as Humboldt rolled to a 27-7 halftime lead and was never in trouble.

'OSC' Letters Burned Into Lawn at Oregon
