New York—U.P.—The distaff side soon will have its own "Who's Who."

Wheeler Sammons Jr., associate publisher of the general "Who's Who" has announced the weaker sex now occupies such a strong position in "business, government, science, politics and cultures" that a "Who's Who of American Women" was necessary.

The first edition, scheduled for 1958, will contain 15,000 to 20,000 entries, he said. But he has no idea yet of some of the better known personalities to be listed. His firm will work with the women's archives of Radcliffe College, Cambridge, Mass., in compiling the volume.

Sammons said that on the women currently listed in the general "Who's Who"—there are about 2,500—still will have a place there, but also may be included in the new volume. There is no charge for listing.

"All we ask is the cooperation of the ladies in supplying the facts," he said. The facts do not necessarily have to include a woman's age.

Said Sammons: "That's a secret she can keep if she's sensitive about it."

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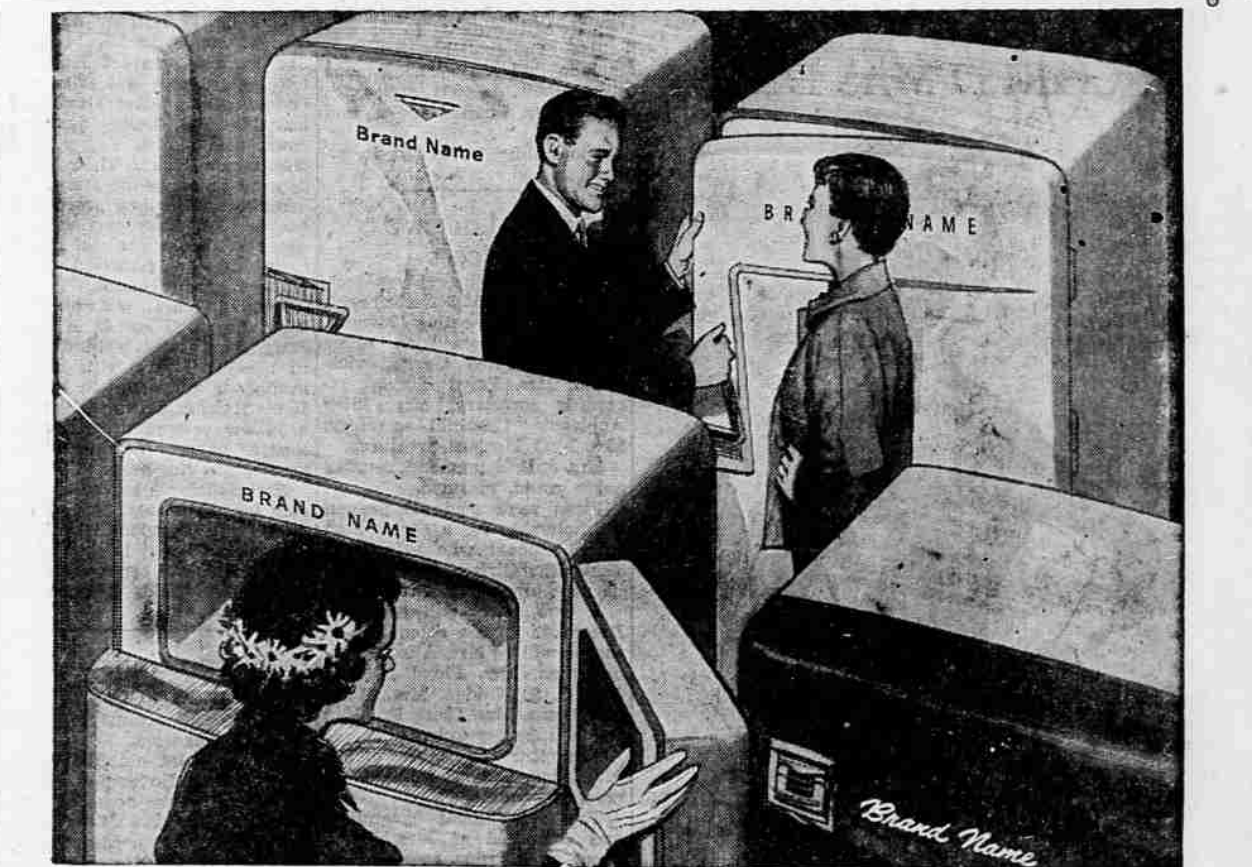
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
