Four Medford Men Scheduled to Talk At Corvallis Meet

Four Medford men are scheduled to speak at the Oregon State Horticultural society annual meeting Dec. 6 and 7 at the Oregon State college Corvallis.

Sessions during the two days will be divided into sectional meetings. Chairman for the apple and pear section on both Thursday and Friday will be R. M. James of Medford.

Talks Scheduled
Included in the schedule is a talk by A. C. R. Stone, Water Resources Development corporation, Spokane, on weather modification in relation to the fruit industry. The research used in this talk was gathered in the Medford area.

Pear pollination studies at Medford, 1956, will be presented by W. P. Stephen, entomologist, Oregon State college; W. J. Rogers, with the weather bureau in Pomona, Calif., and stationed in Medford during the spring, will speak on equipment for frost protection in the Pacific Northwest; and John Higdon, Medford, will give a talk on thinning Bartlett pears.

On Dec. 7, Gordon Kershaw, Medford, will give a grower's observations of rootstocks in the Pacific Northwest, and later that day Clifford Cordy, county extension horticulturist in Medford, and John Higdon, Medford, will participate in a panel discussion on the pear virus and stony pit situation in Oregon.

Panel Discussion
During the panel discussion the progress on pear viruses at Medford will be given by J. A. Milbrath, plant pathologist at OSC. This pear viruses progress project was financially supported by the Medford pear growers.

Also attending the meetings will be Orville Hamilton, second vice president of the society, and Dave Lowry, a trustee.

Police Stop Girl In Suicide Try

An 18-year-old Medford girl attempted suicide about 3:20 a.m. Saturday by slashing her wrists with a jagged piece of broken glass after she had parked her car on the 1st National bank parking lot, 1 East Main st., Medford, according to Medford police.

She was discovered when Officer Gene M. Dupuy investigated a noise in the parking lot while on patrol in the area. Dupuy said he drove into the parking lot and saw the girl pick up glass. She then got into her car. Dupuy said when he reached her car the girl was slashing her wrist with the glass. He jerked the glass out of her hand, according to police records, and asked her to come with him to the police station.

The officer reported that the girl refused and left in her car. She was taken into custody later by two other officers, police said.

Personal troubles was given as the reason for the attempted suicide. Police said they discussed the girl's problem with her and released her to the custody of her parents.

Two Local Groups Due on Television

J. P. Carson, a television cameraman and director, is town filming the story of two local organizations for later broadcast on the "Industry on Parade" program sponsored by the National Association of Manufacturers.

Yesterday, Carson spent most of the day filming the operations of "Roxby Radio," the radio communications network of the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association, the only network in the United States operated by a cooperative, non-profit group of lumbermen and loggers.

The network and its affiliate, "Sexton radio" in Josephine county, cover most of southwestern Oregon, providing immediate communications for service and emergency purposes.

Today Carson was filming the gift fruit packing operations at Bear Creek Orchards, which originated the gift fruit industry a number of years ago, and now has an international clientele.

Non-Agricultural Work Remains High

Salem (UP)—Despite seasonal declines, non-agricultural employment in Oregon remained over the half-million mark last month, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported today.

The commission said 509,000 wage and salary workers were employed on non-farm jobs, a drop of 14,700 from September's all time high of 524,000.

The October level was about 50,000 above the low of last winter and 15,800 above a year ago.

Weakness of the lumber market caused a drop of 5,100 to 82,900 in that industry. Most of the loss was in smaller logging and sawmill operations.

Construction began its usual seasonal decline but at 28,200 was still 3,000 above a year ago.

Four Persons Escape Oregon Coastal Tides

Cannon Beach (UP)—Four persons had narrow escapes from the sea yesterday because of erratic tides of the coast.

Mrs. Mary McCoy, Portland, almost lost her life when she waded in to rescue her 13-year-old son, Frank, who was being swept to sea in a small rubber raft. She said she had difficulty returning to the beach. Meanwhile the tide switched and her son was carried back to shore.

Two Seaside frogmen, Larry Hurd and Len Parrott, managed to swim to safety after their 17-foot dory capsized off Haystack rock. They took a large rubber life raft out to try to salvage their boat and gear. Seas swept the raft a mile to the south before the men were able to get back to shore a second time. The dory was missing.

Dog Stands Guard Over Wrecked Auto

Salem (UP)—A small mongrel dog named Bumpy kept guard in his master's smashed automobile here for 24 hours after an accident sent the car owner to a Salem hospital with serious injuries.

Charles Anderson, Portland, skidded off a curve Saturday night and both he and the dog were thrown from the car. When Anderson was removed to the hospital the dog returned to the car and kept vigil all day yesterday.

New York (UP)—Stocks were frightened by a Russian train dispatcher today after an extension of Friday's rise.

The market rose to noon. Shortly thereafter Berlin reported that the Soviets blocked passage of a Western Allied train from Berlin to the West. That brought moderate selling and knocked stocks down from their highs.

Some of the shipbuilding issues proved sensations. New York Shipbuilding which sold as low as 19 a share earlier this year touched a new high at 58 where it was 22 points higher than the previous close.

American Ship Building hit a new top at 104 up 7 1/4 and held a little more than half the rise.
