# Eastern New York Braces for Expected Heavy Fall of Snow

Heavy snow warnings were posted early today for Eastern New York and much of New England as two separate storms began moving through the northern one-third of the nation.

Meanwhile, a state of emergency was ended Sunday midnight in the Erie, Pa., area. The emergency was declared after a snowstorm ended Sunday night.

Light amounts of snow and rain were deposited early today from the upper and middle Mississippi Valleys through the Ohio Valley and the Great Lakes to New England. Despite the wide arc of precipitation, both rainfall and snow accumulations were quite light.

Pellston, Mich., reported two inches of new snow for a ground accumulation of eight inches, and both South Bend, Ind., and Detroit reported one inch of new snow.

The second storm—which was to breed the heavy snow accumulations along the East Coast, spread rain early in the morning along the Atlantic Coast north of Philadelphia to Southern New England and south into Eastern New York and Western New England.

Residents of the Lake Erie area returned to normal work schedules today as bus services were restored. But they kept an eye on the weather and a snow shovel close by as weathermen predicted about two to four inches of snow for Pennsylvania's third largest city.

Colder weather chilled the northern and central plains and the extreme western edge of the upper and middle Mississippi Valleys. Temperatures, however, remained above the 10-degree mark, weathermen said, with

the only lower temperatures in Northern Minnesota and the mountains of Colorado. International Falls, Minn., had a reading of eight degrees above zero and Fraser and Eagle, Colo., reported 7 and 6-degree readings respectively.

## Telephone Tieup Threat Erased

Portland — (U.P.) — The threat of a statewide telephone tieup in Oregon was erased here Saturday night when the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company and the Communications Workers of America reached agreement on terms of a new contract.

A memorandum of agreement was signed here yesterday. Local units of the union have until Dec. 4 to ratify the contract, which went into effect yesterday and extends to Jan. 4, 1958.

Under the agreement, workers will receive pay boosts ranging from \$2.50 to \$5 per week. About 6000 employees in Oregon are covered by the contract.

A federal mediator sat in on the sessions Friday and Saturday after being requested by the union and the concurrence of management.

The union's contract expired a week ago after twice being extended for short periods of time.

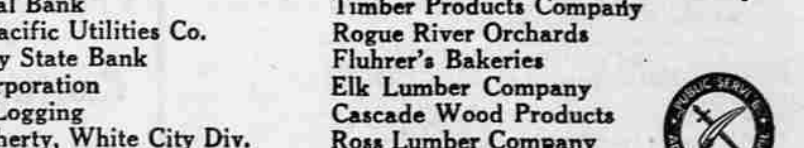
