Official Statement Made To Bolster Western Relations

Augusta, Ga. (U.P.)—The White House said today that differences between the United States and Great Britain and France over the Middle East situation should not be regarded as "a weakening or disruption" of a great and historic alliance.

The White House statement, designed to shore up shaky relations between this country and the Western Allies, was issued as President Eisenhower's vacation headquarters here after the chief executive conferred by telephone with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in Key West, Fla., and Acting Secretary Herbert Hoover Jr. in Washington.

Dulles Going To Paris

Dulles will come to Augusta next Sunday for a first hand review of the international situation with Mr. Eisenhower, preparatory to Dulles' departure for the NATO Ministerial Council meeting in Paris Dec. 11.

The White House also reported today that the Iraq request for U.S. assistance against a reported Soviet arms buildup in Syria was before the President for consideration and discussed by the chief executive this morning with Dulles and Hoover.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty also announced that Sen. John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.), former ambassador to India, would leave for New Delhi Nov. 28 for talks with Indian

Prime Minister Nehru preliminary to Nehru's visit to this country starting Dec. 16.

Answer To Soviet

After announcing Dulles would confer with the President here Sunday, Hagerty said that the President regarded NATO as "a basic and indispensable element of American defense alliances against the continuing Soviet Communist threat to the peace and security of the world."

Sen. Knowland Favors Russia UN Expulsion

St. Louis (U.P.)—Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) said Monday the Soviet Union should be expelled from the United Nations until Russians troops leave Hungary.

The Senate minority leader also proposed an armed emergency U.N. force ready to act in 24 hours, not 24 days.

Knowland outlined a program to curb Russian actions in Hungary before 1,500 mayors gathered here for the American Municipal Congress.

He said, "nations can die in less time than delegates can talk. I don't want this country's freedom to depend on long debates in the United Nations."

Cleveland Papers Go To Press Again

Cleveland (U.P.)—The Cleveland Press and the Cleveland News, both afternoon newspapers, publish today for the first time since Nov. 1.

The morning Cleveland Plain Dealer resumes publication Wednesday.

The Cleveland photoengravers union overwhelmingly approved a new two-year contract Monday night to end this city's newspaper blackout.

Cleveland has been without regular dailies since Nov. 1 when the Cleveland unit of the American Newspaper Guild went on strike against the Press, a Scripps-Howard newspaper.

Babysitter, Children Die of Suffocation

Moundsville, W. Va. (U.P.)—Two young brothers and their bachelor babysitter died of suffocation Monday night when an old-fashioned gas stove consumed the oxygen in a windowless, one-room house.

The bodies of the children—Dennis L., 6, and Timothy L. Conner, 10—were found sprawled on the floor a few feet from the door, the only opening in the cement-block structure near their suburban McKeefrey home.

Slumped in a chair in front of the seven-burner gas stove was Howard Phillips, about 52, of Phillips, W. Va. He had died in his sleep.

Eastern Air Lines, Union in Agreement

Washington (U.P.)—Negotiators for Eastern Air Lines Inc. and the AFL-CIO International Machinist union have agreed to a one-year wage contract with pay hikes of 13 to 27 cents an hour for 4,800 ground employees.

The pact, announced by the union Monday, spells out details of an "agreement in principle" reached Thursday night just before the union's strike deadline. It is subject to ratification by union members.

Husband Too Shy; Wife Granted Divorce

Cairo, Egypt (U.P.)—An Egyptian newlywed has been granted a divorce because her husband is too shy.

Starting with the wedding night, she testified, she waited five months for her husband to get over his shyness, but received beatings instead.

The court granted her a divorce Monday on grounds the husband's shyness lasted too long.

Tommy Dorsey Death Declared Caused by Accidental Choking

Greenwich, Conn. (U.P.)—A medical examiner ruled today that bandleader Tommy Dorsey, the "sentimental gentleman of swing," accidentally choked to death in his sleep.

Police and Dorsey's family denied there was any mystery surrounding his death Monday in the locked master bedroom of his \$130,000 home. He died just two days before he was due to appear in court to reply to his third wife's divorce suit.

Medical examiner Dr. C. Stanley Knapp said after an autopsy the 51-year-old musician vomited while he slept, and food lodged in his windpipe and lungs.

Police who were called to the 23-room house after Dorsey's fully clothed body was found by Vincent Carbone, his business manager, agreed with the medical examiner's findings. They said there was no evidence of foul play, and nothing to indicate that Dorsey took his own life.

However, Knapp said Dorsey's vital organs will be sent to the state toxicology laboratory in Hartford, Conn., for analysis.

An empty bottle, which Mrs. Jane (Janie New) Dorsey had said contained her husband's sleeping pills, was found in a bathroom adjoining his bedroom.

The Dorsey brothers' band played as usual Monday night in the Cafe Rouge at the Hotel Statler in New York. But the trombone player's equally famous brother, Jimmy Dorsey, was in seclusion. Lee Castle, a trumpet player, directed the band.

The brothers started as Dorsey's Wild Canaries in Carlin's Park near Baltimore in 1922 and zoomed into national prominence in the twenties and thirties. Their greatest fame was won with separate bands.

His family and close associates said Dorsey was in the best of spirits the day before his death. They said a note to his wife, the former Jane New

of Atlanta, Ga., found in his locked bedroom, was only one of many that Dorsey normally wrote each day to family members, his associates and his employees. Addressed "Dear Janie" and signed simply "T," it said:

"Thanks very much for the dinner—it was wonderful, and be sure to thank your mom. I am leaving early in the morning. Kiss Susie (their 7-year-old daughter) for me before she leaves for school."

Eugene Grade School Damaged by Flames

Eugene (U.P.)—The Noti grade school, about 15 miles west of here, was damaged by fire yesterday when flames burned out the interior of a combination auditorium and cafeteria building.

Officials said the fire started in the furnace room. A physical education class was in session in the building at the time and the youngsters were quickly taken from the building.

The building, located about 20 feet from the main school structure, was built in 1955.

Freighter Sends Out Call for Assistance

Manila (U.P.)—The American freighter Charles Dant sent out a distress call early today saying it was in "immediate danger" and asking for help.

The message was picked up by the RCA Marine station in Nila. It gave the ship's position as 16 degrees 33 minutes north and 119 degrees 58 minutes east, which would place it off the northwest coast of Luzon.

The skipper of the Charles Dant said the U.S. Navy ship Muskegon was speeding to his assistance.

Meanwhile, the Japanese freighter Towa Maru was reported to have sprung a leak and sunk Monday afternoon about 600 miles east southeast of Formosa. Rescue ships were making an effort to find survivors.
