

Hunter Hospitalized When Mauled by Bear

McMinnville—(U.P.)—Clarence F. Mullins, government trapper and hunter from Carlton, Ore., was in McMinnville hospital today being treated for wounds suffered when he was mauled by a 300-pound bear Sunday noon a mile from Cherry Grove.

Mullins had fired a shot that wounded the bear which was threatening the life of Mullins' dog. The bear dropped the dog and turned on Mullins before he had a chance to reload. Mullins was pinned under the bear until the wounded dog drew it off with continued charges. Once Mullins was freed, he shot and killed the bear.

Mullins has been hunting predatory animals for the U.S. fish and wildlife service for 17 years. He said this was the first time he had had a close call with an animal.

Meier Trust Fund Object of Lawsuit

Portland—(U.P.)—A million-dollar trust set up for Frank Meier of Portland, nephew of the late Gov. Julius Meier and son of the late Abe Meier, was the object of a suit filed here yesterday.

Meier brought the action to break the trust, claiming that the trustees sought to limit him to funds needed for maintenance and comfort and refused to permit him to draw additional amounts.

The complaint said the trust as set up in 1952 to keep Meier's funds from any possible alimony or separate maintenance claims at a time when he was contemplating a second marriage.

Defendants include the United States National Bank of Portland and a brother, Allen E. Meier.

Pastoral Counseling Among Responsibilities of Church

Pastoral counseling is one of many responsibilities of a minister in a locality.

Recently the Rev. George Trobaugh, assistant pastor of the First Methodist church, said "where a problem exists in a home, and if both parents come for help, either together or separately, the more possible a solution to happier living can be worked out."

The subcommittee of the Mental Health committee studying family problems asked him to illustrate a typical situation. Information shared with a minister is confidential, he pointed out, but cited as an example, a family in which the children went to church school each Sunday, but the teachers were puzzled by their behavior. The oldest in primary class never entered into activity unless greatly encouraged and although she had always gone with the same group of children she seemed to have no particular friends. She started to criticize other children to try to build herself up in her teacher's eyes.

The kindergarten teacher found another of the children restless and inattentive and unable to concentrate to listen to stories other children found interesting. He made fun of their enthusiastic participation.

The baby cried and clung to his mother when she left him at the nursery, remained listless

and would not accept play toys from the nursery school helper. In all the children there was a vague feeling of unhappiness.

Ministerial Call

A friendly ministerial call was made to get to know the family better and to explain vacation Bible school about which the parents seemed agreeable because "children need religious training." The parents were aloof throughout the call.

Later the children stopped going to church school. One of the teachers found that the mother had taken the three children to live at her parents. No one knew the undercurrent of unsaid feelings in the home, and the parents thought they could work everything out by themselves. Instead they took their frustrations out on the children through their expectations of model behavior.

Since living with the grandparents was not successful, the family tried reconciliation, and the mother went to her minister for help. He found that she was not satisfied with the husband's job and earnings, thought he could do better for the family and that she should go to work which he stubbornly opposed. Instead of discussing their feelings they stored up resentments. After several visits to her minister, she began to understand what was behind her ambitions and to live within their income.

The father had ridiculed help for himself, but appreciated the change in the attitude of his wife and began to share more in family life. The children's behavior changed in church school, reflecting the security gained from the happier climate at home.

Answers to various questions concerning family problems are being solicited through a survey of professional groups who see families with personal troubles by the Mental Health committee of Jackson county. The committee meets Thursday noon in the conference room of the courthouse annex.

Elizabeth Cooperates With Gasoline Rationing

London—(U.P.)—Queen Elizabeth II will go to Scotland Friday by train instead of plane in royal cooperation with the gasoline crisis, it was reported today.

Rationing is scheduled to begin in three weeks, but the fuel shortage already has hit motorists hard. The crisis was caused by the Suez canal blockade and the blowing up of pipelines crossing Syria.

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Huge Waves Damage Oahu Beach Homes

Honolulu—(U.P.)—Residents of the northwest coast of Oahu Island were warned today to "be on your guard" for a possible recurrence of huge waves that destroyed one beach home, damaged several others and injured three persons.

The Weather Bureau said the heavy seas, which some persons said were 25 to 35 feet high, were caused by a "deepening low pressure area to the north of the Hawaiian Islands, coupled with heavy winds."

The waves began building up early Tuesday until at last they began smashing into the front yards of beach front homes. Ten families from a military housing area along Sunset Beach were evacuated as a "precautionary measure."
