

Morse, Neuberger To Be in Thick of Liberals' Campaign in New Congress

Washington—The liberal bloc of Democratic senators—which includes the senators from the Pacific Northwest—has reached agreement that they will lead a drive in the new Congress to try to gain the legislative and political initiative which has been held in recent years by the conservatives of both parties.

Sen. Morse was one of the few who stayed on the attack against the administration on a consistent basis, issue after issue. It is not so much his successful re-election campaign that convinces Democrats that this is not a fatal strategy to follow, but presumably the popular president has had his last personal campaign. And looking toward the elections of 1958 and 1960, the issues will be more clearly divided between the two parties rather than between Ike and the Democrats.

The showdown with southerners, liberals feel, would also cut into the gains made by the Republican party in the past election in the votes of Negroes who in recent years have favored the Democratic party but this year switched over because the GOP

looked more promising on civil rights. The outcome of this upcoming struggle may signal the direction the country will take when the middle-of-the-roadism of the present has been supplanted by a national desire for change.

Government to Sell Columbia Basin Farms

Salem—Veterans are offered priority in the government sale of 131 full-time farm units in the South Columbia basin irrigation district in Franklin county, Washington, Vere A. McCarty, service division manager for the Oregon department of Veterans' affairs, has announced.

Veterans' applications must be filed by Dec. 31 in the office of the bureau of reclamation, Ephrata, Wash., to be included in the drawing.

Prices on the farms range generally from \$6,000 to \$8,000, although a few are priced between \$1,500 and \$2,500 and one is as high as \$31,275.

The farms are divided into two categories. Veterans qualifying for a farm in one group must have assets worth \$5,500 or \$5,000, cash. For a farm in the other group the veteran must have assets worth \$8,500 or \$7,500 cash.

Applications are available in Oregon from county veterans' service officers or the department of veterans' affairs, state finance building, Salem, and state office building, Portland.

Syria Said Massing Troops Near Lebanon

London—(U.P.)—Semi-official Turkish forces said yesterday in Ankara that Syria was massing troops on the border of Lebanon in another threat to peace in the troubled Middle East.

The sources said Syria, backed by a flow of arms and ammunition from the Soviet Union, hoped to force its tiny neighbor into the Communist orbit.

In Beirut, the Lebanese parliament urged veteran U. N. diplomat Dr. Charles Malik to rush to New York and do his best to salvage the peace in the Mideast and to prevent another Korea.
