



SHADY COVE-TRAIL Accidents Mar Weekend

Shady Cove Trail—Earl Evers, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Ernest Evers, of Shady Cove, miraculously escaped serious injury when the car in which he was riding, with the Kroon family, who were en-route to Seattle, went over an embankment six miles south of Canyonville on the Tiller-Trail highway. Two people were killed in the accident, Enocj and Anna Kroon. Evers, who was on his way to Everett, Wash., where he was to start a ministry was badly shaken up and bruised and is confined in the Canyonville hospital. He will convalesce at home until he is well enough to start his ministry work. The accident happened when the car in which the Kroons and Evers were riding was struck from the back by another car.

Mrs. Miller is survived by her husband, Ernie Miller, of Shady Cove, one daughter, Mrs. Jack Gardner, of Medford, and a grandson, Michael Gardner. Mrs. Miller had resided in the Shady Cove area for some time and had been employed at different times, at the Echo Tavern. She passed away Monday morning at Sacred Heart hospital, Nov. 26.

Georgia Mason, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curt Mason, of Shady Cove, received six broken and several cracked ribs when the car in which she was riding, with Bill Caldwell and Sandy Caldwell, of Eagle Point, went out of control on icy pavement. The trio, students at Eagle Point High school, were on their way to the Eagle Point-Silverton game at Salem. Both Sandy and Georgia are well leaders. Georgia is at home after being treated for the injury at Community hospital.

Mrs. Johnnie Minor, of Shady Cove, could have been badly hurt when the front of her dress caught fire from the stove where she was cooking during the holiday week end. Her husband saved her from serious injury by pulling out the flames. The front of her dress was completely burned off.

Overseas Packages Should Be Air Mailed

Christmas packages sent to members of the armed forces overseas now should be sent air parcel post if the package is to arrive before Christmas, the post office department has announced. Parcels mailed regular parcel post at this time may not reach their destination in a month's time.

The post office department also announced that packages mailed within the next week to addresses inside the United States should reach their destinations before the rush of Christmas mailing begins, and will thereby receive more careful handling.

U. S. May Up Number Of Hungary Refugees

Washington—(U.P.)—The United States may increase from 5,000 to about 8,000 the number of Hungarian refugees it will accept.

President Eisenhower earlier this month opened America's doors to 5,000 refugees from the Soviet crackdown on Hungary's freedom revolt. The United States has been criticized since for taking so few refugees, more than 90,000 of whom have now fled into Austria. The White House said recently the 5,000 figure was not a ceiling.
