

# Elections Will Be Held Monday In Special Districts in Area

Elections will be held Dec. 3 and 11 for directors in seven water districts, one sanitary district and three fire districts in Jackson county.

Petitions had to be filed for positions in each district 10 days before the election. Residents will vote from 2 to 8 p.m. in most districts.

All incumbents are seeking reelection. One of the candidates are running for five-year terms. In the Elk City Water district, incumbent George C. Flanagan is seeking reelection. The election will be held at the Haupter Tractor company office, North Pacific highway.

Incumbent Elwood Hedrick Jr. was filed for reelection in the Klamath Water district. The election will be held at the Joseph Rusk residence, 1579 Bigdick rd., Medford.

In the Granddewey Water district, incumbents William Noss and Clifford McGinty were filed for reelection. McGinty was recently appointed director and is running for a one-year term. The election will be held in the Clifford McGinty residence, 2110

Whistle ave., Medford.

Incumbent Edward F. Webber was filed for reelection in the Kings Highway Water district. The election will be held at the Wayne Troxell residence, 1833 South Peach st., Medford.

In the Maple Park Water district, incumbents LaDale Hermon, Philip V. Reuck and Geraldine Graham are all seeking reelection. Renick is running for a four-year term. They were both recently appointed directors. The election will be held at the Bob Walker residence, 242 Ben's lane, Medford.

In the Jacksonville Highway Water district, incumbent Jyle B. Thurman has filed for reelection. The polling place will be at the Oak Grove school.

Incumbent Cecil Watson has filed for reelection in the Charlotte Ann Water district. The election will be held at 3761 South Pacific highway.

In the South Bear Creek sanitary district, incumbent Dewey Gearin is seeking reelection. Polling place will be at 3751 South Pacific highway between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. He is running

for a three-year term. Deadline for filing for office in the sanitary district was Nov. 12.

An election will be held for director in the Rogue River Rural Fire Protection district Dec. 11 at the Hub, Rogue River. Incumbent Joe Allison is seeking reelection. He is being opposed by Edward Lilly, Glen Birdseye, Clethan Voss and Carl Christensen.

An election for two directors in the Medford Rural Fire district will be held Dec. 3 at the Oak Grove school cafeteria. Incumbents Carl Norris and Lou Martin are seeking reelection. Martin was appointed last summer to succeed Harper Hamilton, resigned, for the rest of the four-year term.

Sam Taylor is seeking election as director to fill an unexpired three-year term in the Central Point Rural Fire Protection district election Dec. 3. Other candidates include Dr. Alvin Roberts, for a five-year term, and Harold Gebhard, seeking to fill an unexpired one-year term.

Tacoma — Representatives of 16 pulp and paper companies with 28 mills in Washington and Oregon have announced formation of a permanent research and educational organization, the Northwest Pulp and Paper association.

The group will report on pulp and paper's growing economic and social importance in the northwest and coordinate and utilize the industry's research and engineering developments in air and water pollution abatement.

Howard W. Morgan, vice president and manager of Weyerhaeuser Timber company's pulp division, is president of the association; R. S. Wetheimer, Longview Fibre company, is vice president; and Lawson P. Rurcotte, Puget Sound Pulp and Timber company, is secretary-treasurer. Vinton W. Bacon, former executive officer of the California state water pollution control board, is executive secretary.

The award was made at a court of honor for about 10 Boy Scouts of Troop 1, Medford, recently. Randolph, a freshman at St. Mary's high school, is the first Catholic boy in the Greater Lake Area council to receive the Ad Altare Dei award.

The award is a recognition the church gives to a Catholic Boy Scout for advancement in the spiritual phase of the scouting program.

It was made on the authority of the Bishop in the diocese of the Diocesan Scout committee.

The three principles which are required of a Catholic Scout candidate for the award are Christian knowledge, church participation and service and Christianity in action.

The Ad Altare Dei award is a bronze cross suspended from a ribbon in papal and national colors under a bar-pin bearing the inscription "Ad Altare Dei." The award was approved on a national basis in 1941.

In 1946 a committee of diocesan scout chaplains, representing all regions of the country, established the award. They met on behalf of the Catholic Committee of Boy Scouts of America and stipulated the national minimum regulations and requirements they feel are desirable for their scouting program.

At the court of honor awards went to Ferris Simpson, silver eagle award; David Turner, star award; Michael Whinnihan, Pat Stinson and Jerry Vadac, all first class pins. Merit badges were awarded Ray Nougier, poultry keeping; Gregory Wright, music; Jerry Vadac, basketry; and David Roubier and Arthur Ewing, citizenship in the home.

## Six Tree Farms Are Certified

Six new Jackson county tree farms have been certified recently by the Industrial Forestry association, according to Nils B. Hult, president.

A total of 14 west coast tree farms in five Oregon counties amounting to 10,337 acres were certified by the association. The new tree farms increase the total Douglas fir region tree farm area to 4330,654 acres. They are all non-industrial forest properties.

New tree farms in Jackson county include the Nani Valley tree farm, owned by Willis Stiehl; Hidden Valley, Ted and M. Esther Shimek; Shady Cove, William and Martha Bishop; Dead Indian and Mountcrest tree farms, Hillcrest corporation; Cantrails, Harlan Cantrall; and China Gulch, W. E. Shannon.

A total of 91 new tree farms have been certified in 1958, Hult said. About 388 forests are now
