Robbers Provide Money for Onlookers

Chicago — (U.P.) — Things went all wrong Friday for two holdup men who unintentionally made a Christmas gift of their loot to a pleasantly surprised crowd of onlookers. Money in five and \$10 bills and coins cascaded onto the street and scattered to the wind from the bandits' pockets moments after they had grabbed a \$3,300.37 cash bag from 35-year-old William Kunich. Their slickup skill was not matched by their driving prowess, however. After speeding from a parking lot where the robbery occurred, they sideswiped another auto at an intersection, and went the other way. Police found a crowd at the street corner, giddy, scooping up the bills and coins. Police said \$170 was left when the gold rush was over. Kunich told authorities he had drawn the money from a nearby bank and had intended to take it to his father's tavern for a check-cashing reserve. He said the two men snatched the bag of money after he parked his car in the lot adjacent to the tavern.
