Refreshments will be served by the men in the lodge. George Howard is chairman for the meeting and Mrs. J. D. Brummond, noble grand, will preside.

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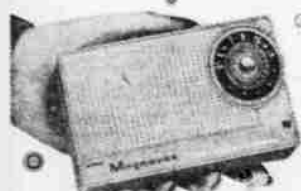
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
