Cranberry Juice Cocktails

New York—(U.P.)—Cranberries have a new role in holiday meal planning—as a cocktail.

The juice of the berry can be used in combination with wine or other potables, or combined with fruit juices for a first course. Try equal quantities of dry white wine and cranberry juice, chilled and served on ice with a lemon, cherry and mint garnish. Or, combine a 1-pint bottle of cranberry juice, the juice of 1 small lime, 1 egg white and 1 cup finely crushed ice. Shake until frothy. Serve on crushed ice.

Another Leftover Idea

New York—(U.P.)—The holiday turkey leftovers are good to the last mouthful—when prepared in this main dish. Cream the turkey (or chicken) in 1 can of cream of chicken mushroom soup, blended with 1/2 cup of milk. Add 1/2 cup of cooked green peas or lima beans. Pour into a shallow baking dish. Top with 2 cups of moist sage stuffing (either the package mix, or your own making). Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hour, or until hot and lightly browned on top. Yield, 4 servings.

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2/4 cup milk
1 egg
1/4 cup soft shortening
1 cup sifted flour
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
