Fruit bread, or "stollen," is delicious served with warm butter and hot coffee. After the bread is baked but still warm, brush with a powdered sugar icing and sprinkle with almonds and bright bits of cherry.

For the stollen use:
1 cake or package yeast
1/4 cup lukewarm water
2/3 cup milk
1/3 cup shortening
1/3 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
3 1/4 to 3 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 cup chopped or ready-diced roasted almonds
1/4 cup golden raisins
1/3 cup halved candied cherries
Powdered sugar icing (basis 1 cup powdered sugar)
Dissolve yeast in water. Scald milk, add shortening and sugar, and stir until sugar is dissolved. Cool to lukewarm. Add well-beaten egg, almond extract and

yeast. Blend in 2 cups flour and beat until smooth. Stir in almonds, raisins and cherries. Add remaining flour, and mix until smooth. Cover and let rise in warm place until doubled in bulk (about 1 1/2 hours). Punch down, knead lightly, and pat to 12-inch circle. Fold over in half, and press edges together firmly. Place on greased baking sheet. Brush top with melted shortening. Let rise 1/2 hour in warm place. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) about 30 minutes. Spread top with powdered sugar icing while warm.
Makes 1 large loaf.

Higher Coffee Consumption Seen

New York — (U.P.) — Coffee wholesalers predicted today recent price reductions will increase consumption of America's favorite beverage beyond present peaks.

Record world coffee production forced the cost of green coffee down and enabled roasters to announce Monday cuts of two to four cents a pound on whole-sale prices.

The reduction in coffee prices, which have been ranging from 87 cents for some chain store brands to \$1.23 a pound for Chock Full O'Nuts, will be reflected in the family budget in a week or two.

The wave of price reductions was set off by two leading coffee roasters in the East—Martinson and Albert Ehler. Several supermarket chains followed by cutting their private label brands two-to-four cents a pound.

Standard Brands, Inc., producers of Chase & Sanborn, and General Foods Corp., producers of Maxwell House and Sanka, announced three-cent reductions Monday morning. Their brands had been selling for about \$1.15 a pound in the New York area and lower in other areas.

State Institutions

Will Serve Margarine

Salem — (U.P.) — State hospitals and schools will switch from serving butter to margarine on Jan. 1.

For the past three years the state government has been receiving an average of 228,000 pounds of surplus butter each year, but the surplus will not be available next year.

Cost of butter to state institutions was 25 cents for a 64-pound cube to pay for transportation and handling.

Margarine will cost the state about \$3800 a month.

Pinza Reported in Good Condition

Greenwich, Conn. — (U.P.) — Operatic and musical comedy star Ezio Pinza was reported in "satisfactory" condition today after suffering his second heart attack in three months.

The 64-year old former opera basso, who became a middle-aged matinee idol by singing "Some Enchanted Evening" in the Broadway musical "South Pacific," was stricken Monday in the dining room of his home at Stamford. An ambulance took Pinza to Stamford hospital but was sent here because that hospital was full.

The silver-haired singer, regarded as one of the finest basses ever to sing at the met, suffered his first heart attack in his native Italy in September.
