Roseburg Attorney To Be Compensated

Roseburg—UP—Spencer W. Yates, Roseburg attorney who successfully carried his appeal from a contempt of court conviction to the State Supreme Court, will receive \$604.25 from Douglas county as reimbursement for costs of the plea.

Yates was cited for contempt and jailed for two hours early this year when he criticized Judge Carl B. Wimberly. The attorney spent two hours in jail before bail was posted. Several weeks ago the Supreme Court reversed the contempt finding.

Eisenhower Names MacArthur's Kin As Japan Envoy

Augusta, Ga.—UP—President Eisenhower today selected as the new U.S. ambassador to Japan Douglas MacArthur II, State Department counselor and nephew of the famous World War II commander, Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

MacArthur was selected by recess appointment, subject to later Senate confirmation, to succeed John M. Allison who will return to Washington for reassignment. Both MacArthur and Allison are career men in the State Department who are rotated periodically in their jobs. To start in February.

The new ambassador was expected to take over his post in Tokyo sometime in February. Allison actually will continue as envoy until that time.

The name MacArthur has long been famous in Japan and the rest of the Orient. The general, now in retirement as chairman of the board of Remington Rand, served as allied commander in the Far East during World War II. He remained to command the occupation of Japan and was supreme allied commander of forces in the Korean war until summarily removed from his post in March, 1951, by the then President Truman.

Portland Woman Burned in Blaze

Portland—UP—An elderly woman suffered second degree burns and about two dozen persons fled into the street yesterday afternoon when fire damaged the Meredith apartments near downtown Portland.

Miss Etta Mary Floyd, 80, suffered burns on the face and shoulders and was taken to a hospital. A second woman, Mrs. Allan Collins, was overcome by smoke and treated on the scene. Firemen confined the blaze to the rear of the building and damage was estimated at \$5000 to \$6000.

The fire apparently broke out in or near a stove. Mrs. Collins said she heard an explosion and Miss Floyd call out to get help. Neighbors said Miss Floyd ran back into the apartment apparently remembering her savings were in the oven of a gas stove. Elmer Finkel, 66, building superintendent, was credited with saving her life. He carried her from the apartment after being called by Mrs. Collins.

Tennessee School Closed in New Outbreak Of Racial Violence; Minister Given Beating

Clinton, Tenn.—UP—The Anderson County School Board ordered Clinton High School closed today after new outbreaks of racial violence injured a Baptist minister and menaced the safety of Negro students.

"We are going to close the school today, close it tomorrow, and close it until it's safe for children to attend," said Principal D. J. Brittain Jr. Brittain acted on instructions from the school board.

Classes were dismissed and school bus drivers were ordered to take the school's 700 students to their homes.

The decision to close the school, the first state supported public school in Tennessee to be integrated, came after a Baptist minister was beaten by a group of pro-segregationists and two white teenagers tried to invade the school building to

attack a Negro student.

Beaten in Face

The Rev. Paul Turner, 33, a white Baptist minister, was chased by segregationists "like a pack of hounds" and beaten in the face after he and two volunteer aides escorted six Negroes back to the school. Clinton high's nine Negro students had skipped classes for four days because of the growing racial tension.

Only Monday, the school board said it had done all it could to effect orderly integration and called on U.S. Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. to enforce

racial mixing at the school. The Justice Department declined to comment today on whether it will respond to the plea from Clinton school authorities.

This morning, the Rev. Turner and two companions escorted six of the Negro pupils to classes. Police stood by and for a while, everything was orderly, although groups of segregationists standing nearby clearly were upset about it.

After Turner left the school, he was chased, caught, and beaten. A witness said the minister's pursuers went after him "like a pack of hounds." He fought

back hard until police broke up the fracas.

Police jailed Clyde Cook, an outspoken pro-segregationist, and held him without bond for federal authorities. Turner was treated at a doctor's office. Two office workers who rushed to Turner's aid were pelted with eggs and one, Miss Vivian Shootman, was cut on the cheek and under the eye by one of the minister's attackers.

Later, two white teenagers, both non-students, tried to force a white student in the high school's hallway to take them to one of the Negro children and another incident was threatened. Principal Brittain's wife, Mrs. Clarice Brittain, teaching in a nearby classroom, heard the commotion, went out to investigate and overheard one of the boys say he had "come to get one of the Negroes."

The two boys fled when they saw Mrs. Brittain. One of them jostled her before fleeing, but she was unhurt.

Brittain quickly informed school board members that he wanted to close the school. They agreed and the principal hurriedly announced dismissal of classes.

Japanese, Bent on Suicide, Found on Edge of Volcano

Motomura, Japan—UP—A farmer who leaped into a smoking volcano clasped in the arms of his childhood sweetheart was found gasping for life today on the edge of the crater.

Tsuneki Nakajima, 29, and Yoshiko Onikata, 26, exchanged a final kiss and leaped together into Mt. Mihara's "suicide volcano" Monday in an attempt to dissolve an unhappy love triangle.

Nakajima has a wife and child in Gumma prefecture. Yoshiko, his sweetheart since childhood, was said to be disappointed by Nakajima's marriage.

The couple drank a heavy dose of sleeping medicine before plunging, locked in embrace, into the flame and smoke filled pit within view of horrified tourists.

Seconds later, they apparently changed their minds about death and screamed for help.

Two policemen wearing gas masks and heat-resistant shoes climbed 200 feet down the sheer walls of the steaming crater. One was overcome by noxious fumes, but the second was able to reach the would-be suicides. He found the woman unconscious and the man gasping feebly. He dragged Nakajima about 30 feet, but darkness and the poisonous gas fumes forced him to give up the attempt.

Today, two tourists found Nakajima, bloody and burned, on a rock near the lip of the crater. He was too exhausted to move.

"It was so hot and choking there, I kept struggling in the direction of the light without even thinking," he told the tourists, who carried him down to the Motomura police station.

Police descended into the crater again today in search of the woman. They reported she was dead.

Portland CIO, AFL Merger Talks Dated

Portland—UP—Talks will begin here next week to merge AFL and CIO unions at the local level.

William Way, president of the Central Labor Council, said last night that negotiations to merge the Portland Industrial Union Council and the Portland Labor Council would make Portland one of the first cities in the nation to achieve a united labor front on the pattern of national and state mergers.

Way said the labor council would postpone election of officers until March 1 or after the merger is accomplished.
