

Olympic— —Ramblings By BILL BOWERMAN U of O Track Coach

With Track and Field News Olympic Tour, Melbourne, Nov. 29—The approach to today's stint is completely without enthusiasm. However, the reading public should know what a practicing coach thinks about an athlete's disability and whether or not he should compete. (As a spectator it was not my decision that Jim Bailey not run—but as his coach in Oregon I recommended that he not compete unless the effects of the hay fever were gone.) He was still suffering breathing difficulty and did not compete, as you already know.

My personal feeling about injury or infection or allergy is that the boy should be under a doctor's care. If the doctor says OK, then the coach still has to decide whether the boy is physically fit to turn in a creditable performance. At our university, I bet that most high schools and universities do the same. We have had athletes out of competition many times on the recommendation of the doctor, and held them for competition even more because they were not up to their best ability.

Would Have Felt Worse
I know how badly Jim feels that he could not compete in the games. I am as certain as I can be that had he run, he would have been even more disappointed, because he would not have turned in a good performance.

Every other day in the Olympics is ladies day. That is, in the competition. Any one has the misconception that lady athletes are all the "flow horse types" should see these "dolls" compete. It is true that the two Russian weight girls are big and bulky. But, you should have seen the tall Junoesque, beautiful gal from Czechoslovakia who won the discus.

The Aussie girls dominate the sprints and hurdles. Every one of these sprinters is slim, trim, nice-looking and lady-like. The broad jumper from Poland had long blond pig tails to add to her other attractive points.

Yank Girls Miss
Yep, competition for girls is the thing in the rest of the world, and I believe that our U.S. girls are missing something in not having some competitive girls in the field as part of the educational experience. Don't anyone tell me the girls don't like to compete, and some of them need lessons in sportsmanship that they might get on the track.

Have you ever seen anything more competitive than a woman on the golf green, or four girls bidding "four spades, darling," while the clappers are flying. Yes, and all being fair in love, some of the lovelies are quite competitive in courting, too.

In athletics, as in any other life experience, if one gets a licking and learns something from it, then one should be wiser for that bad experience. I claim I got a heck of a whipping. I am most regretful that Bill Dellinger had to suffer because of my incompetence. We talked over the 5,000, at length, the evening after the race. The great little champion is also determined to put into practice the lessons learned here in his post-graduate running.

Kuts Murderous
Vladimir Kuts (of Russia) is a murderous runner. I am certain that every runner there was going to have a go at beating him. His tactics are 100 per cent different from Scandinavian theory, which calls for four 60 second quarters if you want a four-minute mile, etc. Our plan was to run the leader like he were hooked to a 15-yard elastic. When he threw in one of those sprints let him go. Then gradually take up the slack to 12 yards and hold that over pace.

In preparation for the assembling last summer, Bill worked on 65 second quarters. This would put him right with the leaders, but those murderous tactics of that great runner, Kuts, not only brought him victory, it struck out the field and forced seven of the 15 runners to withdraw rather than walk the last three laps.

Had I not been here, the lesson of tactics would not have been learned. The other great lesson was the training it takes to use such tactics.

Hoop Coach Frank Roelandt reported last night that some 12 players from Medford's state A-1 runner-up football squad have reported for basketball. The group includes four cage lettermen. Two other gridgers, including one basketball monogram wearer, have yet to turn out for the court sport.

The Black Tornado hoopmen play Eugene in the Willamette valley city on Friday and Saturday evenings, Dec. 7 and 8.

Cage lettermen who have reported to Roelandt after shedding their grid gear are Dick Copley, Dick McLaughlin, Neil Plumley and Larry Sessler. A fifth letterman, Mike Stearns, is still recuperating from the neck sprain he suffered in the Gresham football game.

Plumley Turns Ankle
Return of the lettermen provided no immediate big boom in the outlook of the Tornado for its cage openers. Plumley, 6-5 center, turned an ankle Monday night and missed drill yesterday. He was to try the ankle on the court this evening. Both McLaughlin, all-state forward,

and Sessler, reserve last year, missed Monday work. McLaughlin had a swollen hand looked at by a doctor. The hand was stepped on several times in the Mershfield football fray last Friday. Sessler was on the sick list.

The two just shot around yesterday. Non-lettermen basketeers, who have made the switch from football, are Bilbee Lane, Tom Hamlin, Tony Brauner, Ron Peery, Dennis King, Jim Funston, Dave Bergman and Frank Albert. Gary Riley, who played varsity and javve ball last season, will turn out when he gets over a charleyhorse.

Of the group which has been drilling for several weeks under Roelandt, the coach has kept five seniors and a sophomore. The seniors are Richard Puhl and Larry Perkins, lettermen, and Jay Mullen, John Payne and Steve Wisely. Don Peek is the sophomore.

So far as the footballers are concerned this week, drills are aimed considerably at getting them acclimated to the basketball court and used to the idea that the ball is round, not oval. Fundamentals are getting attention. Roelandt has his club working on a few patterns in preparation for their season debut with the Axemen of Eugene.

PCL Drafts 5 Players

Jacksonville, Fla.—(UP)—The Pacific Coast league drafted only five players today with San Diego, Vancouver, Portland, and Seattle being the only clubs to make any player selections at the annual minor league meeting.

The five players drafted represented a total cost of \$38,000. Four of the draftees were selected from double-A clubs and one from a class-A team.

Vancouver, which had the first choice, chose catcher Charlie White from Houston of the Texas league. White, who caught for the Milwaukee Braves in 1955, batted .279 at Wichita last season.

San Diego chose outfielder Crawford Davidson from Chattanooga of the Southern association. A left-handed hitter, Davidson batted .282 last season.

Portland picked first baseman Joe Macko from Dallas of the Texas league. The 28-year-old Macko, right-handed hitter, batted .284 for Dallas last season.

San Francisco, Sacramento, Hollywood and Los Angeles all passed on the first round and outside of Seattle all PCL clubs passed on the second round.

Faculty Representatives Study "Letter of Intent" Issue for PCC Recruiting

Beverly Hills, Calif.—(UP)—Pacific Coast conference faculty representatives today studied a proposal designed to halt recruiting of high school athletes who had already committed themselves to another school.

The proposal has been tabbed the "letter of intent" issue. It involves a proposed letter of intent which when signed by a high school athlete would require him to attend the school of his choice and would ban him from competition if he later decided to enroll at another PCC member school.

Final action on the proposal was expected either this afternoon or during Thursday's final session at a four-day PCC meeting here.

Similar Plan
PCC Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt said the Southwest conference uses a similar plan to halt last-minute recruiting. He said, however, "If approved it will not be identical in that it will be more literally a letter of intent instead of a contract."

Representatives Tuesday adopted an amendment to the

code making it more difficult for athletes-students to compete in sports at out of state PCC schools. The amendment undoubtedly will effect Northwest schools which have been attracting many southern California athletes.

It states a student must have at least a "C" average in all his high school courses or bring up his grades to this level before competing in college sports.

Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, California's faculty representative and spokesman for the conference, said the rule change originated with UCLA, California, Stanford, and Oregon about three years ago. He said "It will make it a little more difficult, for example, for southern California players to go to schools in Oregon and Washington."

Routine business continued to dominate the PCC meeting in the wake of the decision by UCLA officials: not to seek withdrawal from the PCC. But although the UCLA "revolt" apparently has fizzed out, some favoring withdrawal insist that the Bruins will make their parting gestures next month at a proposed meeting of conference athletic and faculty representatives with presidents and chancellors of PCC schools.
