

United Press Board of Tutors Rates Kansas No. 1 Hoop Club

New York — (U.P.) — In an amazing tribute to a basketball player who had yet to appear in his first college game, the United Press Board of Coaches today chose Kansas, with Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlin, as the No. 1 team in the pre-season national ratings.

Louisville, winner of last year's National Invitation Tournament and still boasting 6-8 star Charles Tyrus at center, was picked second in the ballots and North Carolina nosed out Illinois for that third spot.

The board, made up of 35 outstanding coaches whose ratings have become accepted as a standard in the game, thus put an unofficial stamp of approval on Chamberlain, the seven-foot Philadelphia who is so good that a professional team drafted him while he was still in high school.

Selected Before Debut
The coaches cast their ballots before any games had been played this season — before Chamberlain made his brilliant varsity debut Monday night by setting school records of 62 points and 31 rebounds in an 87-69 rout of Northwestern.

Louisville has virtually the same squad as last year's NIT champions, less Phil Rollins, but is under an NCAA ban from any post-season play this year. Coach Frank McGuire of North Carolina has a solid squad built around 6-5 Lenny Rosenbluth, who averaged 26.7 points per game last year.

Kansas received the first-place votes of 19 of the 35 coaches, while Louisville received 13.

Ed Machen Rated Edge

Syracuse, N.Y. — (U.P.) — Eddie Machen, heavyweight knockout artist who trains with huge gloves as soft as pillows so he won't hurt his sparring partners, will be a 13-5 favorite when he risks his undefeated status tonight against Johnny Summerlin in a TV 10-rounder.

Machen, of Redding, Calif., makes his Eastern debut in the fight and Detroit Johnny hopes to spoil Machen's streak of 18 victories, 14 by knockouts.

Both fighters moved into the picture as title contenders this year and both would, like a match with Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson and then a shot at the champion, Floyd Patterson.

and one each went to North Carolina, Illinois and Cincinnati. Cardinals Close Second
With points awarded for each ballot on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis for votes from first place to 10th, Kansas received 298 points out of a possible total of 350. Louisville was a close second with 279, a good margin over North Carolina's 196 and Illinois' 171. Southern Methodist, defending Southwest Conference king, rounded out the top five with 150 points.

Dayton, runner-up in last year's NIT nabbed sixth place

as the only other squad to top the century mark in points with 103. Temple took seventh place as San Francisco, national champion for the last two years, sank to No. 8 with the graduation of All-America Bill Russell and K. C. Jones. St. Louis was a close ninth and Western Kentucky edged into the top 10.

The second 10 included, in order, West Virginia, Oklahoma City, Oregon St., Kentucky, Washington, a tie for 16th between St. John's and North Carolina State, then Kansas St., Wyoming, and Vanderbilt.

Len Rosenbluth Sets NC Marks

Lennie Rosenbluth, a 6-6 forward who learned his basketball in New York and perfected it at the University of North Carolina, set two-school scoring records Tuesday night as a warning to Atlantic Coast conference rivals.

Rosenbluth, called "the finest player I've ever coached" by North Carolina's Frank McGuire, scored 47 points to spark a 94-66 victory over Furman in a non-conference game. He broke the one-game record of 45 points which he shared with George Glamack of the 1941 team and sank 20 field goals to better the mark of 19 he set last year.

Rosenbluth ranked sixth among the nation's scorers last season with a 26.7-point average. He established the new North Carolina marks in spectacular fashion, sinking a 30-foot one-hander with just 50 seconds left in the game to snap both old records.

Linfield Nicks Wolves 62-57

Monmouth — (U.P.) — Linfield edged Oregon College of Education 62-57 in a pre-season basketball game last night as Jack Riley, a diminutive dead-eye from Portland, scored 24 points, 22 of them in the first half.

The Linfield JV's also won, 68-60.

Hornung Gains Heisman Trophy

South Bend, Ind. — (U.P.) — Paul Hornung couldn't believe he had won the Heisman trophy, symbolic of the nation's top college football player, because "I thought they were kidding me."

"I didn't actually think I had a chance for it in the first place," he said. "Like sometimes when you're playing a game, after it's over you know whether you played well or not."

"But it meant the happiest day of my life to win it. I don't think I ever received an honor which equalled this for myself or my family."

Hornung, a 20-year-old blond T-formation quarterback from Louisville, Ky., won the trophy with 1,066 points against 994 for Johnny Majors of Tennessee and 973 for Tommy McDonald of Oklahoma.

His victory was by the narrowest margin ever in the history of the 22-year-old trophy.

Corvallis — (U.P.) — The general public wanting tickets to watch Oregon State play Iowa in the Rose Bowl on New Year's day is going to be out of luck.

Jim Barratt, ticket manager at Oregon State, announced that there will be no general public sale of the Rose Bowl tickets.

About one half of the tickets have already been disposed of and Barratt said the remainder undoubtedly will be claimed well before 4 Dec. 8 deadline for the priority groups to pick up their tickets.

More Work Stoppages Reported As SP&S Rail Strike Continues

Portland — (U.P.) — The strike against the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroad went into its fourth day today with more work stoppages reported in the lumber industry and new appeals made for an end to the walkout.

A big mill at Bend was shut down and others were reported closing in the Willamette valley.

Plains have come from the grain and lumber industries as well as from the National Medication Board for President Eisenhower to step in and name a special emergency board to look into the issues of the strike and attempt an early settlement of the dispute.

About 600 men were reported out of work at sawmills in the Eugene area as a direct result of the strike and officials said the jobs of thousands would be threatened in the immediate future unless the dispute is settled. Many mills served by the line already were reducing their operations as lumber stacked up waiting for shipments.

Officials of the big Brooks-Scanlon sawmill and logging operations announced a complete halt at the company's Bend plant and of central Oregon's logging operations, effective at 3 a.m. today.

Company spokesmen said the closure was for an indefinite period, depending upon when the railroad dispute can be settled. About 500 men were thrown out of work by the shutdown.

Grain growers and the Eugene Chamber of Commerce earlier had asked presidential intervention.

The lumber industry also was reported hard hit by the transportation tieup and the Columbia River Packers Association was seeking other means of transporting its heavy December shipments if the strike is not settled soon.

Ships Due at Astoria
At Astoria, where more than a dozen ships are scheduled to arrive to load flour in the next month, milling firms said they had only about enough wheat on hand for operations the remainder of this week.

SP&S engineers walked out in a long-standing dispute over working conditions on the line and in support of a demand for additional pay for engineer called on to perform certain jobs.
