Houdek NAlA Rush Champ; Southern Cal Will Field Inexperienced Hoop Quint

Kansas City, Mo.—(UP)—Larry Houdek of Kansas Wesleyan was named Wednesday as the individual rushing and scoring champion in NAlA football this season.

Another Kansas quarterback Curtis Bennett of Sterling College, captured the total offense crown, according to final statistics released by the NAlA Service Bureau here.

Houdek, called one of the finest running backs in the history of the Salina school, scored 19 touchdowns for a total of 114 points and carried the ball 168 times for 1,466 yards. He finished with a net yardage of 1,432 and a game average of 159.1, losing only 34 yards in nine games.

Bennett, participating in 310 plays, rushed for 1,204 yards and added 962 by passing, for a total of 2,166 and a game average of 240.7 for nine games. He averaged 6.99 yards a play.

Webb Gets Pass Toga

Bob Webb of St. Ambrose College at Davenport, Iowa, won the individual passing crown; Andy Urbanic, Bethany, W. Va., end, the pass receiving honors, and Tom Zaun, Idaho State at Pocatello, quarterback, the punting crown.

Webb completed 77 of 147 aerials, with seven interceptions. His net yardage was 1,278, giving him a game average of 142.0 in nine contests. He tossed 14 touchdown passes.

Urbanic snagged 36 passes for 675 yards and six touchdowns, giving him a play average of 18.8 yards and a game average of 84.4 in eight outings.

Zaun kicked 12 times for a 45.5 average and a total of 546 yards.

Southern Cal Will Field Inexperienced Hoop Quint

Los Angeles — (UP) — An inexperienced University of Southern California basketball team will open its season against Wyoming Dec. 7 and the big problem facing Trojan Coach Forrest Twogood is how to replace his top five men from last year.

Seven lettermen are back from last year and several top prospects are up from the freshman squad and junior colleges. But Twogood must find replacements for four stars who graduated and one who will be lost for the season because of an injury.

Jack Dunn, Tony Palatis, Tony Lovrich and Dick Nagai all left via the graduation route, and Larry Hauser, who was the number two scorer last year, suffered a broken knee cap in practice only a short time ago.

The loss of Hauser was a blow to the Trojans, who were counting on him to be the sparkplug. That role now falls to Jim Kaufman, a 6-foot 4-inch forward, the team captain and now the take-charge guy.

Also back for another tour of duty is center Ken Pearson, who stands 6-5. Other returnees include forwards Norm Price, 6-4, and Jim Pugh, 6-4; guards Chuck Reilly, 5-11, and Danny Rogers, 6-1, and center Jim Sterkel, 6-6.

Only Reilly, Price and Pugh are juniors; the rest are seniors. Reilly is a service returnee who won two letters with the Trojans prior to his call to the colors.

Among the bright prospects coming up from the freshman squad and junior colleges is Kaz Shinzato, a five-foot, 11-inch sophomore who broke the Trojan freshman scoring record last year with 337 points in 15 games.

Others who are counted upon to help the attack are Joe Braun, San Mateo; Phil Dye, Van Nuys; Marty Gonzales, Los Angeles; Ernie Hicks, Hollywood; Jack Mount, Alhambra; Junior Singh, Calpatia; Ken Walker, Los Angeles, and Jim Yocum, Hollywood.

UCLA Threat To Bolt PCC Apparently Flop

Beverly Hills, Calif.—(UP)—Pacific Coast Conference faculty representatives today wound up a four-day meeting in which UCLA's threats to bolt the conference scared no one and as a result, apparently fizzled.

It was expected to be a crucial PCC meeting in the wake of the UCLA threats but the session was devoted mainly to routine business.

The representatives paid no concern to UCLA's dissatisfaction over having been slapped with stiff penalties for illegal financial aid to athletes. In fact, the UCLA move not only fizzled but the school's chancellor, Raymond B. Allen, assured representatives that UCLA would cooperate in any future investigations into athletic code violations.

The only sympathetic action by the representatives came Wednesday when they voted to support the university of Southern California in any appeal the school might make to the NCAA in seeking reduction of penalties for excessive aid to athletes.

The PCC earlier in the year placed all sports at USC on probation for two years but later modified its ruling to apply to only football. But the NCAA not only upheld the PCC ruling but placed in addition all sports at USC on probation for one year.

The faculty representatives, however, made no mention of the UCLA case. Both USC and UCLA paid heavy fines and had players placed on probation for exceeding the limit for aid to athletes.

UCLA alumni, students and faculty members have claimed the school was made the "goat" of the conference and demanded UCLA pull out of the PCC.

It was not known when USC plans to appeal the NCAA edict. Glenn T. Seaborg, University of California faculty representative and spokesman for the meeting, declined to say who originated the move to support USC's expected appeal.

Seaborg said a further investigation, revealed four more cases of illegal aid to athletes. He said three of the cases involved football players and one a baseball player.

The conference in other business Wednesday postponed action on a proposed "letter of intent" designed to keep high school athletes from switching colleges.

There will be two pre-fight matches before the royal. Kurt von Poppenheim, the coast junior heavy champ and a big card on Portland TV, will meet Lee Wong, the popular Chinese, in what should be a real fast moving contest. Don Kindred, the big Negro headbutter, will attempt to beat both Bill Fletcher and Frenchy Robierre within 30 minutes.

Eugene PCC Track Site

Beverly Hills, Calif.—(UP)—Prof. Emmett Moore of Washington State was re-elected Wednesday to his third term as president of the Pacific Coast conference faculty representatives.

The representatives also re-elected Rexford K. Snyder of Stanford as secretary. Dr. Lenn T. Eaborg of the University of California also was named to serve on the conference commissioner's advisory committee.

The group in Wednesday's session of a four-day meeting set the 1957 PCC track and field championships for May 17-18 at Eugene, Ore., and scheduled the conference baseball playoffs for May 31-June 1 on the home field of the Southern division winner.

In other business, the representatives approved the 1958 conference basketball schedule which substitutes annual home-and-home games for the previous biennial arrangement. Teams under the arrangement will alternate sites for their two-game home-and-home series instead of playing both games at the same site each year.

Many Hungarian Athletes Plan To Seek Asylum

Melbourne, Australia.—(UP)—A Hungarian official said today two-thirds of the Hungarian Olympics team — perhaps 100 athletes — will seek political asylum in the United States, Australia and other free nations.

Reports that most of the Hungarian team members will refuse to return to their embattled homeland were confirmed by Hungarian sports minister Gyula Hegyi, Australian government sources and the athletes themselves.

Hungarian hatred of the Russians burst into an open demonstration today during a water polo match that ended in a free-for-all, with Hungarian blood once more staining Soviet hands.

Australian government sources said the immigration office was flooded with "a number of applications" from Hungarian team members who wish to remain here.
