**Eugene Utility Firm Cuts Rates for Users**  
 Eugene—U.P.—Customers of the Eugene Water and Electric Board, municipally owned utility firm serving Eugene, got good news yesterday. The company announced a substantial rate reduction for utility users on its lines.

A company spokesman said the rate reduction will amount to between six and 10 per cent for most residential customers and about five per cent for the average commercial user. The reduction becomes effective Feb. 1, 1937.

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
