Receipt For A Happy Marriage

"How can I improve my marriage? How can I find happiness in it?" We are accustomed to think these are questions of today and tomorrow, but we rarely stop to think that they may well have been the questions of the day when Eve set up housekeeping with Adam. If we have a good marriage, we often wish to improve it; if an unhappy one, to seek its betterment as soon as possible. And it has always been this way with intelligent people. In the past quarter century, we have been more fortunate than the generations before us in finding books and publications touching our problems.

"Problems of human reproduction," by Dr. Paul Popenoe, director of the American Institute of Family Relations, outlines a program for marital happiness which is as applicable today as when it was written some twenty years ago. Happiness in marriage, according to Dr. Popenoe, is definitely related to seven elements:

1. Age: Happy couples are found to be nearer in age to each other, than unhappy partners, as well as younger at the time of marriage. In other words, May and December may live happily together, but statistically June and June have a better chance of success.

2. Education: Happy wives—and husbands—are in general better educated than the unhappy partners. Their mental resources occupy them, rather than petty domestic "sparring."

3. Health: Happy wives—and their husbands—are usually healthier than maladjusted couples. Happiness leaves little place for psychomatic ills and complaints, and healthy bodies make for a sense of complete well-being.

4. Preparation: Well-adjusted couples received sex instruction before marriage. Maladjusted partners often reveal a history of pre-marital "petting" or intercourse.

5. Occupation: Happy wives, as a majority, work inside the home if there are small children. The ratio of working wives rises with the increasing age of the children.

6. Initiation: The happy marriage begins with a well-adjusted marriage night, free from trauma and tension—probably on account of previous instruction.

How does your marriage rate against the above points? The longer a marriage is maladjusted, the harder it is to undo its

ills. Get busy, and keep busy, trying to improve it. A good marriage means happiness and success in living for both partners!
